

# Firefighters respond to more calls

Frederick Area Fire & Rescue has received an above-average number of calls so far in 2018.

The department received 37 calls in 2016 and 36 calls in 2017. If they were getting calls at a similar rate for 2018, they should have received about 24 calls so far. They've already received 30,

according to statistics that Fire Chief Kevin Barton files with the state Fire Marshall after each incident.

Typically, about half of the department's calls are assisting Frederick Area Ambulance—often at accidents, but also in other situations. (These numbers do not include calls in which the ambulance did not require assistance from the fire department.)

## Need to be present to learn

Welcome back—the Frederick Area School is in full swing and excited about the year ahead! New students are excitedly arriving, new technology is being deployed, and new curriculum is being used to drive student success.

No matter how new everything is though, this remains true: Students who regularly attend school have a higher success rate than those who are chronically absent. Showing up for school has a huge impact on a student's academic success, starting in kindergarten and continuing through high school. Research defines chronically absent as missing 10% or more of school days. Therefore, we make it our goal to have children at school at least 90% of the time!

September is Attendance Awareness Month. Even as children grow older and more independent, families play a key role in making sure students get to school safely every day and understand why attendance is so important for success in school and in life.

We realize some absences are unavoidable. But we also know that when students miss too much school—regardless of the reason—they can fall behind academically. In fact, only 17% of those who were chronically absent in their younger years were able to meet reading proficiency scores in 3rd grade! By 6th grade, chronic absence is a proven

early warning sign for students at risk for dropping out of school. By 9th grade, good attendance can predict graduation rates better than 8th grade test scores. Many learning opportunities are missed when a student is regularly absent that cannot be made up by just “doing the homework.”

Here are few tips to help families maintain regular attendance:

- Make sure students have a bedtime and morning routine.
- Ensure your student goes to school every day unless he/she is truly sick.
- Avoid scheduling vacations or doctor appointments during school hours.
- Talk with teachers if your child is feeling anxious about coming to school.

I am excited to be to working with your children throughout the year and thank you for your partnership in getting them to school. If you ever have any concerns, please reach out to myself, teachers, or other staff. We want to make this year a great one for all!

## Tips for the year ahead

**ways of teaching or handling behaviors** – education is not static, it's ever-changing. Thus, your child's teacher or support staff may be trying a new technique to help students succeed. Please don't speak unkindly of any adults or students at school with or in front of your child. If you don't respect school or the people there, your child won't either.

**Let your child fail** – children need to experience failure in order to succeed. Letting your child feel sad, frustrated, or nervous sometimes is so important; they will learn that they can overcome such feelings and that they can trust themselves. Protecting your child too much can lead to helplessness and powerlessness, leaving your child lacking the emotional resources needed to cope with inevitable setback and failure. Childhood is the prime time for mistakes; let them happen and support your child along the way.

Native nations with a supportive learning environment to lead change within their organizations and communities in a more equitable and inclusive manner. The cohort will spend the next year working one-on-one with mentors and jointly in group discussions while attending online learning sessions and three in-person convenings.

“We are excited to engage a diverse group of South Dakotans who span multiple backgrounds, professions, ways of thinking,

points of view, and ages,” said Kari O’Neill, Community Vitality Field Specialist with SDSU Extension. “One of Change Network’s greatest strengths is the cohort’s ability to learn from and assist each other thanks to their breadth of expertise.”

Nickelson says she hopes her experience will help build inclusivity in the community. She’ll start with gathering information: What could we do that would pull all ages together, that we would all be proud of? This might have to do with community health and wellness. “When the community comes

together to celebrate (an accomplishment), differences can fall away,” she said.

Begun in 2017, Change Network is made possible through the collaboration of 3E Productions, Bush Foundation, CommonSense Consulting@Work, MillerHale Associates, National Arts Strategies, SDSU Extension, and Strengthen ND. Participation in the Change Network is generously funded by the Bush Foundation and includes access to a \$5,000 grant to implement a pilot project or support a related ongoing community project.

# CALLS: Firefighters go through more training

About a third of the calls are to put out fires. Frederick Area Ambulance Director Dave Losure noted that several of the recent calls have included serious injuries or other serious medical needs.

“It’s been a few years since we’ve had the helicopter out, and this summer we’ve had it out twice in the same week,” Losure said.

While the fact that someone needs to call 911 of course means something is wrong, an increasing number of calls can actually be a good thing, because it means people are calling when they need help, Barton said. That shows local firefighters and EMTs are getting a reputation for providing good service.

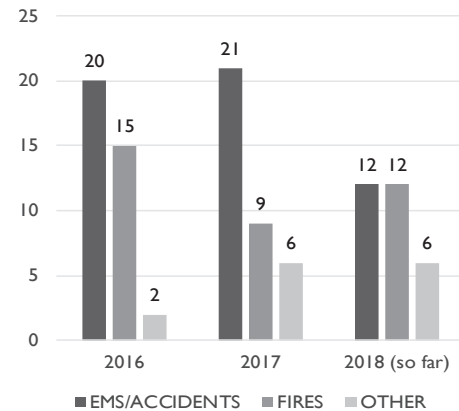
“People trust that you know what you’re doing,” Barton said. “They are more confident to make the call.”

## Moving in the right direction

The fire department has shown improvements in several ways in recent years.

Voters approved a fire district in 2015, which has provided the department with funds to improve its equipment. They

purchased a new No. 1 truck and another pickup grass rig, and they’ve put a larger tank on their tanker truck. Having the fire district means “we don’t have to run with trucks that were outdated,” Barton said.

Another notable improvement is the number of volunteer firefighters. Barton said when he started as a firefighter in 2001, 15 people were on the roster, which is the minimum required. Four or five would typically respond to calls, he said.

Now, there are 28 on the roster, when you count the people who respond at the

department’s three stations (in Frederick, in Barnard, and at Elm Lake). Adding the four EMTs who are not also firefighters to the list means that as many as 32 first responders could potentially serve at an incident.

“That’s great for our area,” Barton said. “We are able to cover a large portion of our district by having all those people.”

Those firefighters are also better trained, said Barton, who became fire chief in 2012. They’ve increased the amount of training they do, and more people show up to those trainings, which means they are better prepared overall when they get to an incident. They don’t need to rely on just a few people who know what to do giving orders.

“Now, everyone pretty much steps up,” Barton said, adding that it also gives the volunteers flexibility to not respond if they can’t for some reason—“not everybody has to be around all the time.”

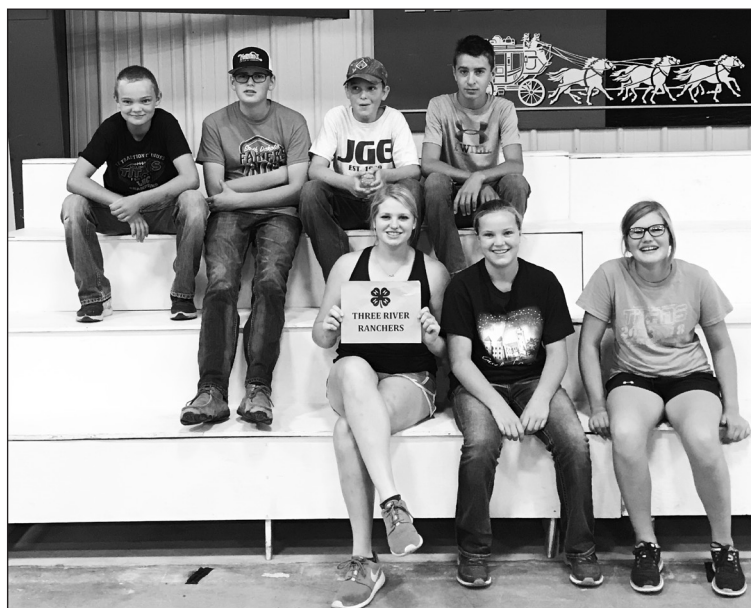

The Leola-Frederick Titans have started off their season with a 2-4 record after six games.

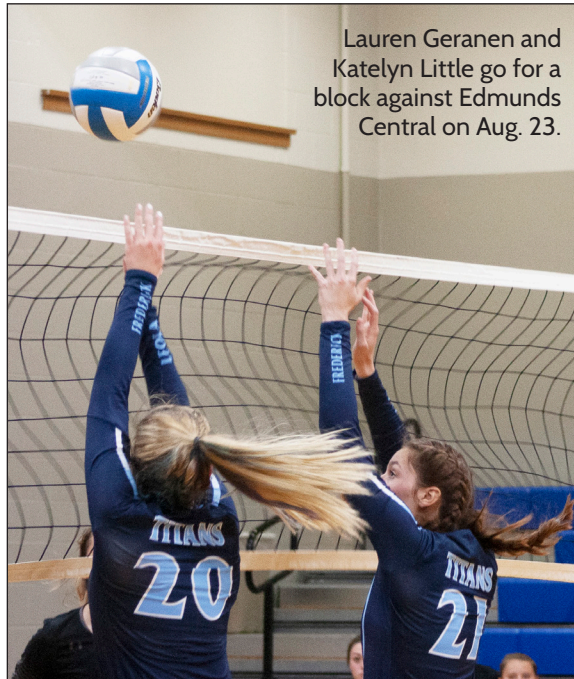
