

Legislation puts a new floor under teacher salaries

As I am writing this column, we are entering mid-March and in the first week of our final nine weeks of school. Track practice began this week with a near 70-degree day and no snow on the ground. In my almost 30 years of education as a teacher and administrator, I do not think I have ever experienced an entire year of school without a snow day or late start or early dismissal, but that is where we are this school year. (Knock on wood!)

Teacher pay

The legislative session recently ended, and one of the more important bills affecting education came down to one of the final days before its passage. The Governor had recommended a 4 percent increase for education, and there was also an effort to improve the state's standing in teacher pay, as we have been near the bottom of that list for several years. Initially it started out as HB1048, but what ended up getting passed was SB127. Beginning with FY25 (the next school year), a minimum teacher salary will be set at \$45,000. Also included within that bill is a benchmark for average teacher compensation, which considers the benefits that are received on top of salaries (health insurance being the primary figure). Districts must now be accountable to that target moving forward as well. Frederick Area's current average teacher compensation is \$59,627. Those two benchmarks (minimum salaries and aver-



age teacher compensation) will increase each year based on the percentage the legislature allocates toward the increase in educational funding. District's failing to meet these benchmarks will see their state aid reduced.

Opt-out election

There will be no school board election this time around, but there will be an election on Tuesday, April 9, to vote on whether to approve a proposed \$450,000 opt-out for the next five years. Three years ago, voters approved a \$200,000 opt-out, and it is in its final year. The Board has made the decision to try to pass a new opt-out to replace the current one that is expiring.

There are two primary reasons for this proposed opt-out. The first is that the ability for the district to continue transferring funds from its Capital Outlay to the General Fund in the same capacity as we have been able to for the past few years will no longer be possible. Many districts were negatively affected by legislation passed about 4-5 years ago, which limited how much revenue they could generate in the capital outlay fund. The legislation immediately

decreased our district's annual revenue to the tune of about \$350,000 annually. At that time, districts were able to transfer up to 45 percent of revenues from capital outlay to the general fund each year. Up until now, districts were still able to transfer the same amount as they were before passage of that bill, but that will no longer be possible, and now the transferable amount must be within the 45 percent threshold of revenues generated any given year.

The new teacher funding bill is the other reason the district feels this proposed opt-out is necessary. An overwhelming majority of general fund expenditures go toward salaries and benefits of district employees, and without the opt-out, it would become much more difficult for the district moving forward in the same capacity.

Basketball

The boys' basketball season will come to its conclusion at the end of this weekend, as our boys qualified to compete in the State B Tournament held at the Barnett Center in Aberdeen. They defeated the Potter County Battlers in the SoDak16 on Tuesday, March 5, to advance on. We enter the tournament as a #6 seed and will play #3 seed Castlewood in the final game of the opening day.

The girls' basketball season ended on February 22 in the final round of region play. The team finished the season with a 15-7 record, and I'd like to recognize a few of our student-athletes for their accomplishments during

this past winter season. Laura Sumption and Sofia Losure both received 1st team All-conference honors and were repeat recipients to the list from last year, and Jillian Ellwein received Honorable Mention recognition. Laura was also named as the MVP of the conference, an award she shared last year with Warner's Ava Nilsson.

New seasons

As for the upcoming Spring activities, Coach Marty Morlock will once again lead the track program, with Wayne Haas, Janelle Barondeau, and Megan Russo assisting again. As I mentioned earlier, track practice began this past week, with 19 boys and 19 girls in grades 6-12 participating this spring. I will be coaching the golf program again this spring, and the season officially begins toward the end of the month. I believe there will be 15 students participating.

Other activities/events that will be coming as we enter the final portion of the school year include Kindergarten Screening on March 22; Prom in Frederick on March 23, Large Group Music Contest on March 27; State FBLA on April 7-9; State FC-CLA on April 21-23; Elementary Spring Concert on May 2, at 7:00 pm; Jr High / High School Spring Concert on May 9, at 7:00 pm; Awards Night on Wednesday, May 15, at 7:00 pm; and Commencement on Saturday, May 18, at 1:00 pm.

The last day of school for Frederick Area students will be Thursday, May 16, with a dismissal time of 1:00.



Strong season ends just short of SoDak 16

The Leola/Frederick Titans finished their 2023-24 season with a record of 15-7. Like last year, we finished the regular season with a 14-6 record. Unfortunately, we did not advance to the round of 16 as we did last year, losing to Northwestern in the third round of regional play.

Three players received conference recognition this year. Laura Sumption and Sofi Losure were again named to the 1st Team All-Conference, just as they were last year, and Jillian Ellwein received Honorable Mention recognition. Laura was also recognized as MVP of the conference, an honor she shared with Warner's Ava Nilsson last year. A much-deserved honor for Laura to say the least! Laura notched her 1,000th point during our contest in Webster and ended her career just shy of 500 rebounds and had over 200 assists. Sofia Losure finished just shy of 1,000 points at 991, but pulled down over 750 rebounds in her career, which I believe is second all-time in Titan history. As a team we scored more points per game (47) than the previous season and also held teams to an average of under 40 points per game (39) again this season.

We struggled a bit early in the season, defeating Langford Area and Aberdeen Christian, the latter coming in overtime, which was followed by losses that put us 2-2 before Christmas break. We started January with seven straight wins to move to 9-2 before dropping our game at Britton/Hecla. We finished the season and postseason from that point on by going 6-4.

We again entered the postseason as the #2 seed in our





region and hosted Wilmot in Leola. We got off to a slow start, leading 10-9 after the first quarter and 24-21 at the half, but outscored Wilmot 28-14 in the second half to pull away with a 52-35 victory. Laura Sumption had a game and season high 32 points in that contest. We then played #7 seed Northwestern in Frederick for a chance to advance to the SoDak16. After scoring the first bucket of the game, we would not hit another for the rest of the first quarter, and we trailed 11-3 after one. The second quarter was a draw, and we entered halftime with that same eight-point deficit. We were outscored 14-7 in the third quarter. Down 16 points with roughly four minutes to

play, a three-pointer from Laura Sumption cut it to thirteen. It was the first of five 3-point buckets for Sumption in the fourth and resulted in a furious comeback attempt that cut the lead to just two points with eight seconds to play. Northwestern hit both free throw attempts, and our hopes of a comeback win were no more.

Next year's team will have a much different look to it, as we say goodbye to six seniors, two of which have been starters since their eighth-grade year. Their hard work, leadership, and dedication to the program will be sorely missed. With that said, that opens up opportunities for the girls who return to write their story for Titan ball.

Fast and furious

The Titans have built their success this season on a fast pace and relentless defense that they can sustain because of their deep bench. At least 10 Titans can be subbed in while still maintaining the team's signature defensive pressure. This has showed in up a pattern for many of the Titans' games: The first quarter tends to be close, but the Titans pull away later in the game as their opponents start to flag.

That was the case in the SoDak 16 game against Potter County in which the Titans snagged a one-point lead at the end of the first quarter with a long buzzer-beater by Brayden Sumption. They built a six-point lead going into halftime before finishing with a 16-point advantage.

"I think it just goes back to believing in what we do," Pashen said. "Our pressure and speed is going to wear you down. The physical and mental fatigue of our style can wear teams down."

Beyond that, Pashen said that skill in ball movement, cutting, and vision add to the magic of this year's team.

Senior Brayden Sumption and junior Noah Kippley typically lead the Titans in scoring, but many other players can be relied on to make shots if the defense gives them the opportunity.

"They are athletes who play well together and are fun to watch," he said.
