## Daycare now open in Frederick

Sometimes an opportunity is hidden inside a challenge. That seems to be the case for Misty Dosch, who has started a daycare business in Frederick after difficulty finding childcare for her own children, who are now school-aged.

"I saw a need for it in the community," Dosch said, adding that she has always wanted to work with children.

Dosch opened Tiny Titans Daycare on Nov. 4. It's located at 403 4th St. in what's known to some as the lumber company building, which has served as a child care facility in its past but more recently was used as lodging for hunters and other out-of-town guests. Prairie Builders, Gary Peterson's construction company, is still based out of the back half of the building.

Dosch was previously an administrative assistant in the human resources department of Avera.

A good deal of preparation had to happen before the business could open. More rules apply because the daycare isn't the provider's home. The building had to be inspected and certified, and Dosch had to start work toward getting a child development associate credential. She will test for the credential in June, and it will then be good for three years.

The daycare is open from 7 a.m. to 6 p.m. Monday through Friday. She accepts ages 0-12 and currently has openings for ages 3 and older. Those interested should contact Dosch at tinytitansdaycare@gmail.com or at 605-228-8562.

When this column comes out, the Christmas and New Year's holidays will be just around the corner. I am not sure where the time went, but at least for me, this past fall went by unbelievably fast!

Boys and girls basketball seasons got their starts on Dec. 2 all across the state. Thanks to Mother Nature, the Leola/ Frederick programs started on Tuesday, Dec. 3. Brock Pashen and Trevor Van Tilburg return to coach the boys, while myself and Sarah Sumption will be coaching the girls. A total of 16 boys are participating, with eight each from the two schools. There are only 11 girls, with nine from Leola and two from Frederick. Due to the low number of girls, the eighth-graders will have the opportunity to come up



and participate with the junior varsity and varsity as well.

Athletes in grades nine through 12 who participated in football and volleyball this past fall were recognized by the SDHSAA with the "Academic Achievement Team Award." To qualify, the collective average of GPAs by all student-athletes involved in the varsity sport must be at or above a 3.0. Both the football team and volleyball team were well above that mark.

The first semester will come to an end on Friday, Dec. 20.


The junior high and high school students will go to Aberdeen that afternoon for an activity, and will have their choice of either ice skating or bowling.

Students will return to school from Christmas break on Monday, Jan. 6. As second semester begins, so too does another semester of dual credit opportunities, and a half a dozen or so of our students are taking advantage of getting an early start on their post-secondary educations. Students taking dual credit coursework receive the credit on their high school transcripts, as well as on their college transcript. The Board of Regents sets requirements that students must meet before they are able to enroll. If students qualify and take advantage of the opportunity, they can save hundreds of dollars, as the cost for them to take the courses now is at a fraction of the cost that they would pay once they have graduated from high school and are enrolled in college.

Upcoming home activities include a basketball doubleheader with Aberdeen Christian on Thursday, Dec. 19, beginning at 4 p.m. The boys will host Oakes, ND, on Thursday, Jan. 9, at 6:30 p.m.; and there will be a couple of doubleheaders after that. Waverly/South Shore will be here on Saturday, Jan. 11, beginning at 1 p.m., and Northwestern will come on Friday, Jan. 24, beginning at 4 p.m.

We've had a little taste of winter already, and undoubtedly there will be more to come before it is all said and done.



says Karla Hofhenke, SDFU Executive Director.

John and Margaret first became involved in SDFU youth programming through their five sons: Mark, Chris, Eric, Taylor and Warren. "When the boys were young, I enjoyed seeing them get involved in Farmers Union education programs and camps," explains John. In his 70s, John helps his sons in the family crop and cattle operation near Frederick. "I always saw this programming as a resource to help develop leaders for the future of agriculture."

Each year, SDFU state staff and interns host day camps in counties across the state where youth learn about cooperatives, agriculture and farm safety. The organization also hosts district and state camp where youth have the opportunity to develop and practice leadership and team building skills. Throughout the school year, SDFU provides **REAL** leadership Junior development programming to rural schools throughout the state.

"Supporting South Dakota's family farmers and ranchers means we support the entire family – kids and all. Our youth programming is key to achieving this," says Doug Sombke, SDFU President. "And

it takes supporters like John and Margaret to keep this going year after year."


For several decades, Margaret served as Brown County Education Director, coordinating the Brown County Day Camps. "They needed someone and I like working with kids," says Margaret, who worked as a teacher before staying home to raise her sons. A few years ago, Margaret handed off the duty to Mike Traxinger, but she stays connected through many of her 22 grandchildren who remain involved in SDFU Youth programming. "I'm happy the grandkids are involved because the camps teach them about farm safety," she says. "Farm safety is something vou can never have too much education about. Farms are a great place to raise kids, but they can be dangerous places too."

Descending from a long line of cooperative leaders, in addition to farm safety, John appreciates cooperative education provided by SDFU. generations, those of us living in rural communities depend upon cooperatives to provide us with essential services," John explains of necessary services like telephone, electricity, fuel, farm inputs. 
