## A look at the Dakotas' COVID situation

Just how bad is the COVID-19 pandemic in the Dakotas right now? That depends a little on the metric we're looking at. Looking at cases, the situation is not good. On Oct. 1, North Dakota had more active cases per 100,000 (53.7) than New York had at the peak of its surge this spring (50.8). Only Florida has been worse, hitting 55.3 cases per 100,000 on July 17. South Dakota's high point so far has been 46.3 on Sept. 28.
(Also, the positivity rate-the percentage of tests that come back positive-in South Dakota has been abysmal; public health officials say it should be 5 percent or lower, and it has been over that since July and over 20 percent since mid-September. This means we're not testing enough to find enough cases to reduce the spread through isolation and contact tracing.)
Thankfully, the situation is not as dire when looking at hospitalizations or deaths. Neither Dakota is anywhere near the high point of hospitalizations that New York had in the spring. As for deaths, at its high point, New York hit 5 deaths per 100,000; South Dakota has been around 0.3 in September, and North Dakota rose to 0.8 by the end of September. Knowledge of how to best treat COVID-19 has increased since the spring, and health care providers are more prepared. But that doesn't mean we're in the clear: Hospitalizations and deaths lag cases, so we could still see more of both. And in fact, the trendlines for both are rising.
