## Northstar Basketball

A season that started out in agony ended in ecstacy when the FrederickHecla Northstars advanced to the State B Tournament for the first time as a coop. It was Frederick's first trip since 1967, and Hecla's first since 1994. It was rough going for awhile as two of the team captains began the season on injured reserve, recovering from injuries incurred during football. Both recovered, however, and made excellent contributions. Derrick Dinger was the team's leading scorer and rebounder, averaging 18 points, 9.6 rebounds, and 2.6 assists per game. Jeremy Skoglund
averaged 2.8 assists per game.
The other three co-captains also had outstanding seasons. Warren Sumption paced the 'Stars in assists and steals, averaging 11.3 points, 5.2 assists, and 4.1 steals per game. Nathan Bakeberg poured in 11.3 points per contest and also grabbed 5.5 rebounds per game. Collin Shelton scored 7 points a game, dished out an average of 2.9 assists a game, and stole the ball an average of 3.5 times. Dinger and Bakeberg led the squad in shooting as well, with averages of $48 \%$ field goals, $79 \%$ free throws; and $49 \%$ field goals, and $79 \%$ free throws, respectively. Justin North also chipped in with 5.7 boards per game.


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## Season Extended

During the post-season Frederick-Hecla avenged three of its regular season losses by beating Doland-Conde and Warner to claim the District 2B title, and later handling Roslyn to win the Region 1B championship.
