



























Every Minute Counts

Barnard students have been very active this year. They participated in the Homecoming parade, Christmas concert, and various other activities.


The Barnard Tag Team Members along with the upper classmen, sold T-shirts to raise money for guest speaker, Sally Roesh Wagner.

When asked what time of the day they liked best, most students responded, "Recess!!"







CHANGING WITH THE TIMES

This year Frederick High School has expanded its academic possibilities by setting up a telecommunication system. The system now makes it possible for the students to take classes that were not offered to them before. The courses being taken this year are Art Through the Eyes of the Lakota, Jounalism, Spanish I, Agricultural management, Spanish II, and Physics.

The Telecommunication system is connected with five other neighboring high schools that are also hooked up to the system. Bristol High School teaches Spanish I and Spanish II. Groton teaches the Agricultural management class. Hecla High School teaches both the Journalism class and the Physics class. From our school, Mrs. Brokaw and Mrs. Schanzenbach are currently teaching the Art Through the eyes of the Lakota Class.

The Telecommunication system had many problems getting on line at first. There was a delay in getting the equipment shipped, and then there were various technical difficulties that slowed things down. The system wasn't completely set up and running properly unit the end of the first semester.

A lot of work was put in to get the system ready to go. The ceiling was lowered, a new lighting system was installed and carpet was also installed. Four television sets, two video camera's and microphones were added to the room. Television sets were also placed in Mr. Barondeau's and Mr. Getty's offices to moniter any acitivity taking place in the telecommunication room.


M O D U L E

Library Expansion

At the end of the 1993-94 school year, Mrs. Brokaw was busy packing up books in the library. Over the summer, the divider between the library and the assembly room was moved. The result of the remodeling was a more permanent division between the two "rooms".

The library section was expanded, while in turn, the old assembly (now history room) was made smaller.


With extra room added to the library, teachers could bring entire classes in to do research and not have to worry about being cramped for space.

Art Through the Eyes of the Lakota

The telecommunications system put in place at FHS allowed a new cultural class to be taught. Schanzenbach and Jackie Brokaw instructed students on the ways of the Lakota Indians. Together they worked on many projects throughout the year. They finished a turtle wallhanging, now displayed in the telecom room (pictured at top left). It represented the thirteen months of the Lakota calendar. On Native American Awareness Day, the students went down to the elementary school to give a program for the younger kids. Each high school student was responsible for one part of the presentation. From November 28 to December 1, Dallas Chief Eagle, an experienced and well-traveled hoop dancer, worked with the FHS students as part of the Artists-in-Schools program. On December 1, the Lakota class sponsored a program which included hoop dancing by Chief Eagle and junior high students, and the presentation of Peace Medals to supportive members of the community. The Lakota Art students had a good time this year learning about a different way of life.






BLAST FROM THE PAST








Handicapped Group


