 NorthThe 1995 Frederick-Hecla Northstars started the season with a disappointing loss to Faulkton in overtime. However, this didn't dampen the spirits of the players. They kept pushing forward and managed to end the season with a 2-6 record. The strong spirits of the Northstars also helped to boost two of their players, Josh Thorpe Hecla and Jon Ellwein of Frederick, to the All-Conference team. Jim Sumption of Frederick was also recognized for his efforts with honorable mentions.

The Northstars rushing was led by Jon Ellwein of Frederick with 99 carries for 410 yards and two touchdowns. The second leading rusher was Jim Sumption of Frederick who had 55 carries for 310 yards, six touchđowns and 3 extra points. The Stars quarterback, B. J. Richter of Hecla completed 59 passes out of 159 attempts; ten of these were for touchdowns and five were for extra points. His passes amounted to 875 yards for the season. The leading recetvers for the Northstars were Justin Knecht and Josh Thorpe, both of Hecla. Justin received 20 passes for 305 yards and four touchdowns, while Josh received 19 passes for 224 yards and two touchdowns.

The stars tackling was led by four seniors: Jon Ellwein, Joe Ness, and Darren Dosch, all of Frederick, and Josh Thorpe of Hecla. Josh led the four with 87 tackles and 2 sacks. Next was Jon with 67 tackles, followed closely by Joe with 65 tackles and 1 sack and Darren with 63 tackles and 3 sacks.
