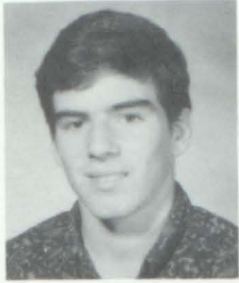
Float Winners

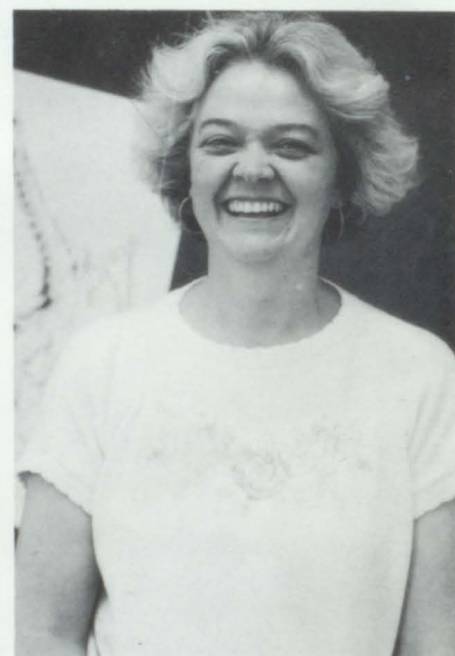

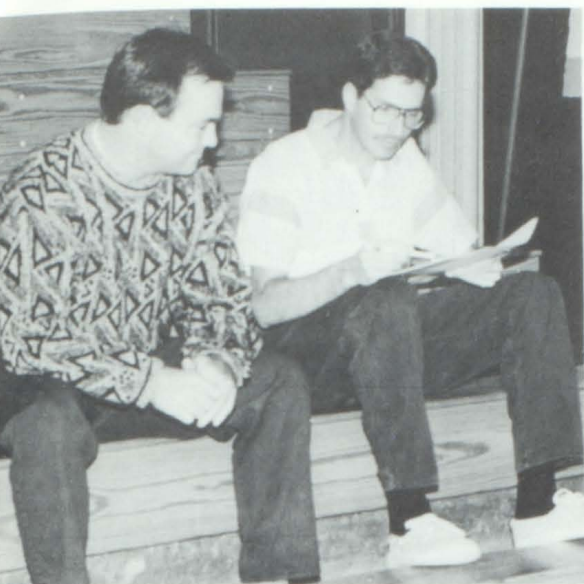
Staff Adds Two

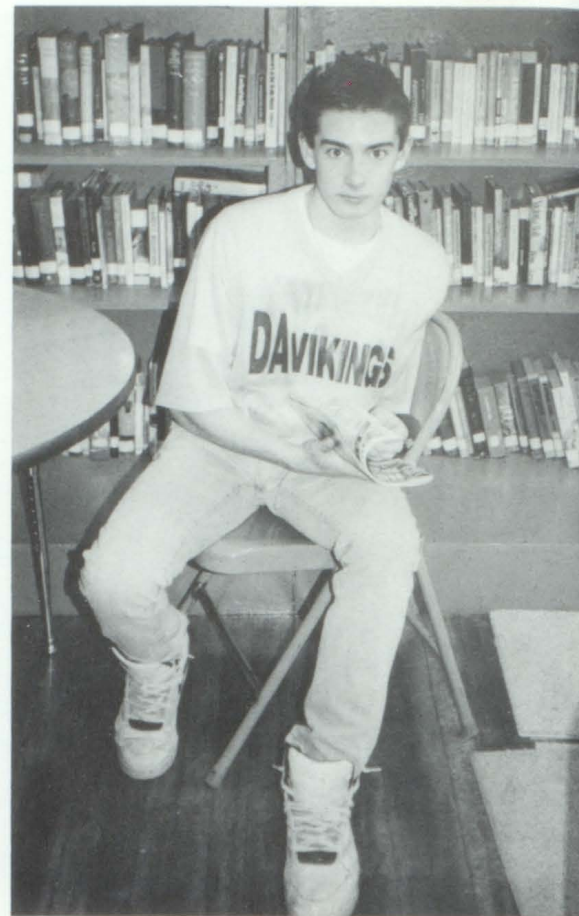

Mrs. Brokaw Returns

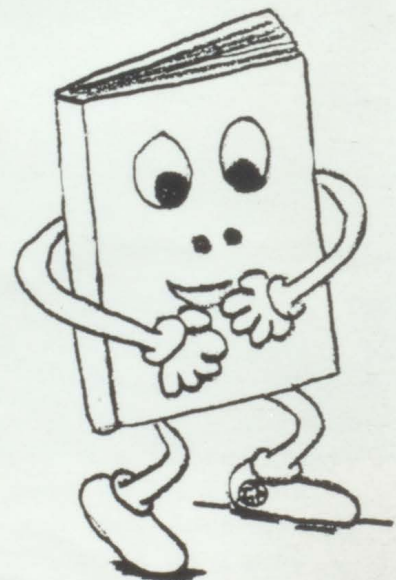

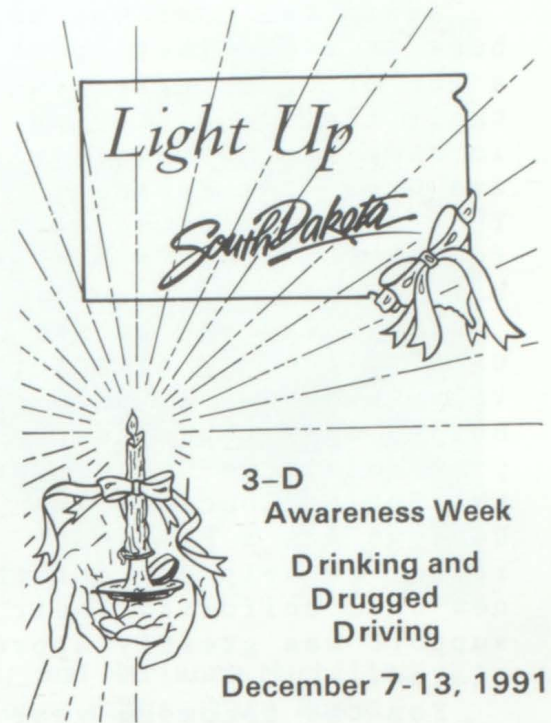


Successful 3-D Week

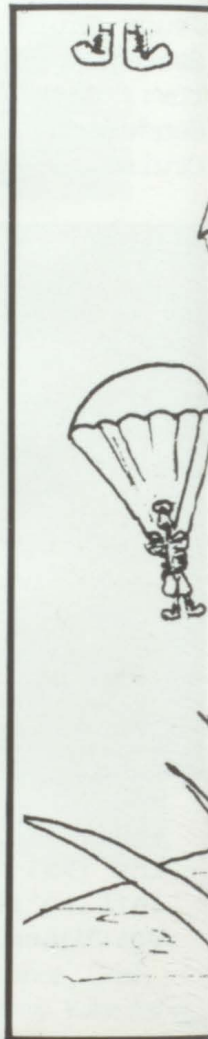

Fashion Statement

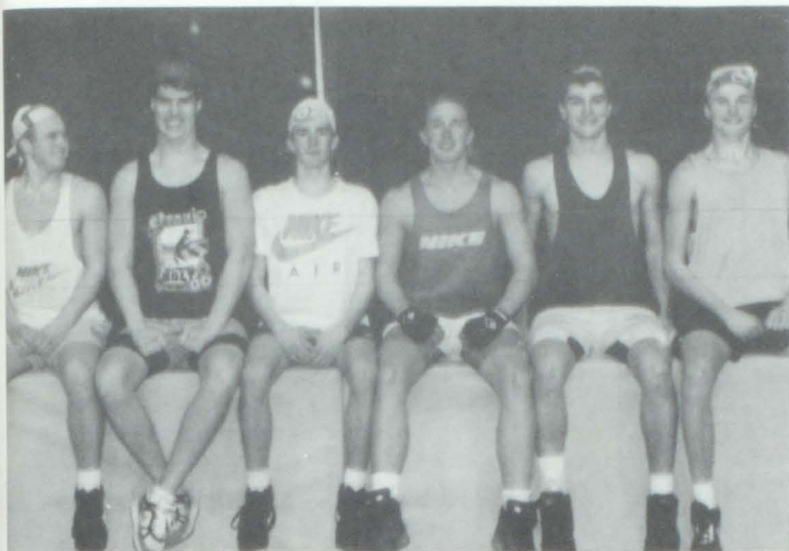

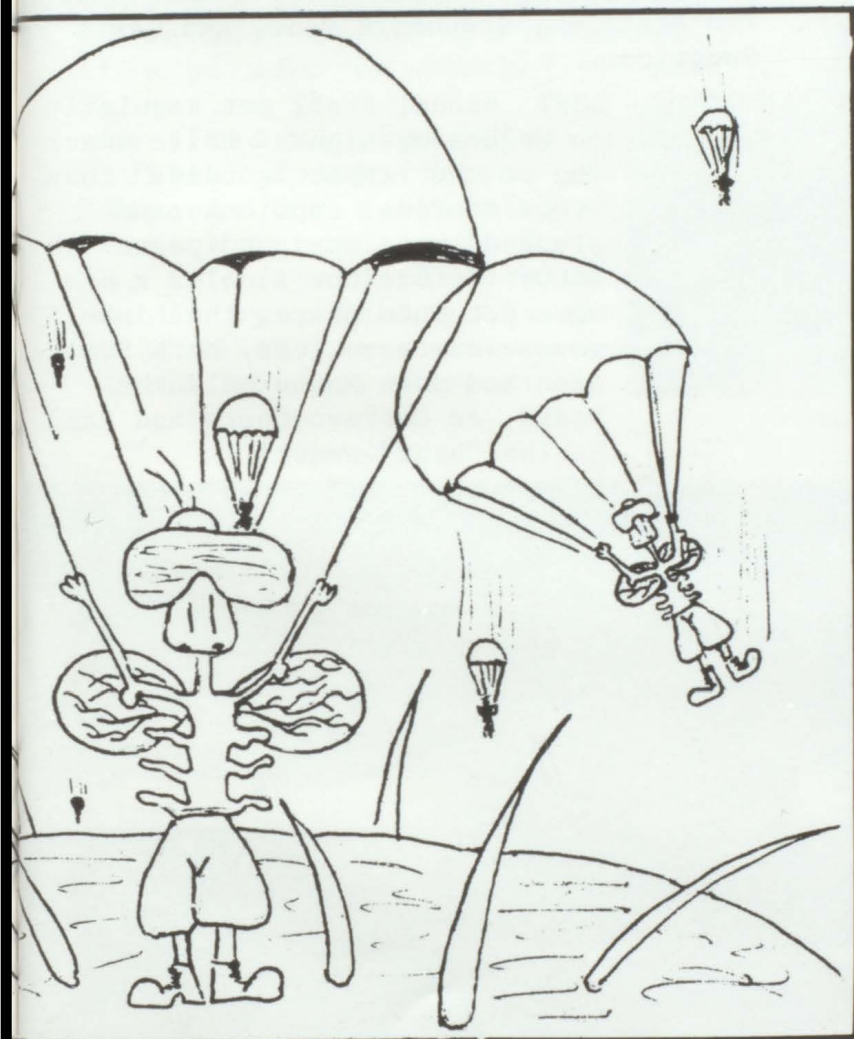

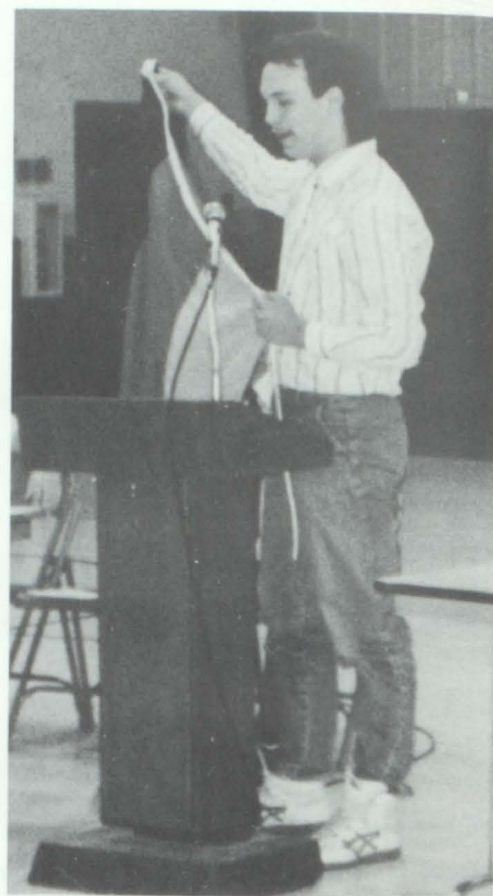

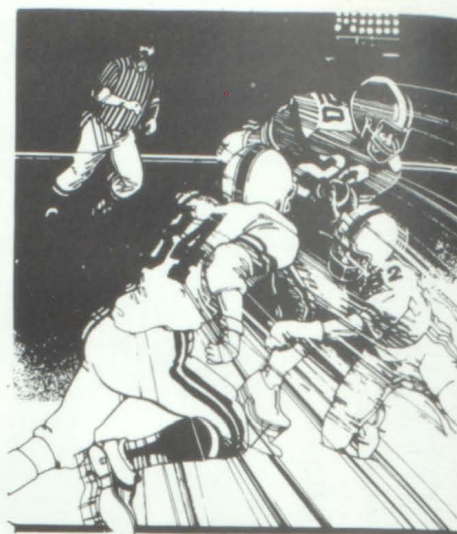

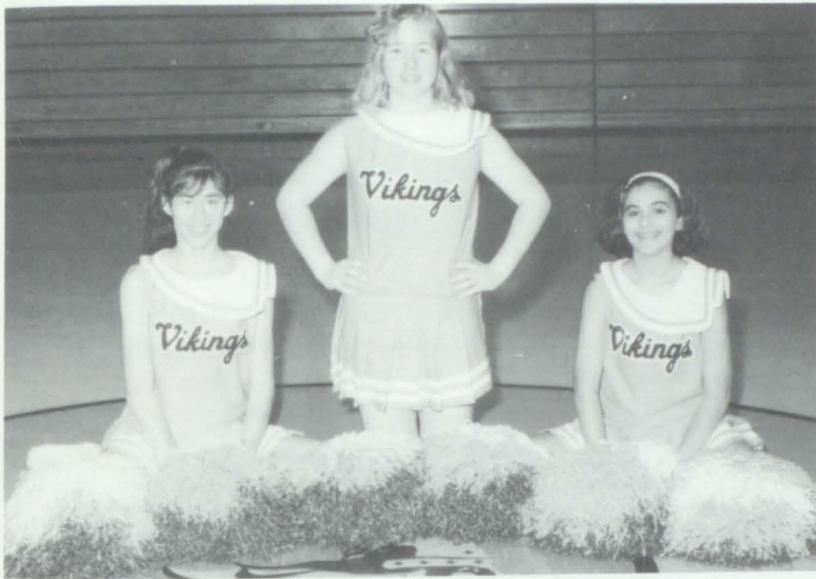

The viking team has some young talent that is going to aide in the future of the Viking basketball team.

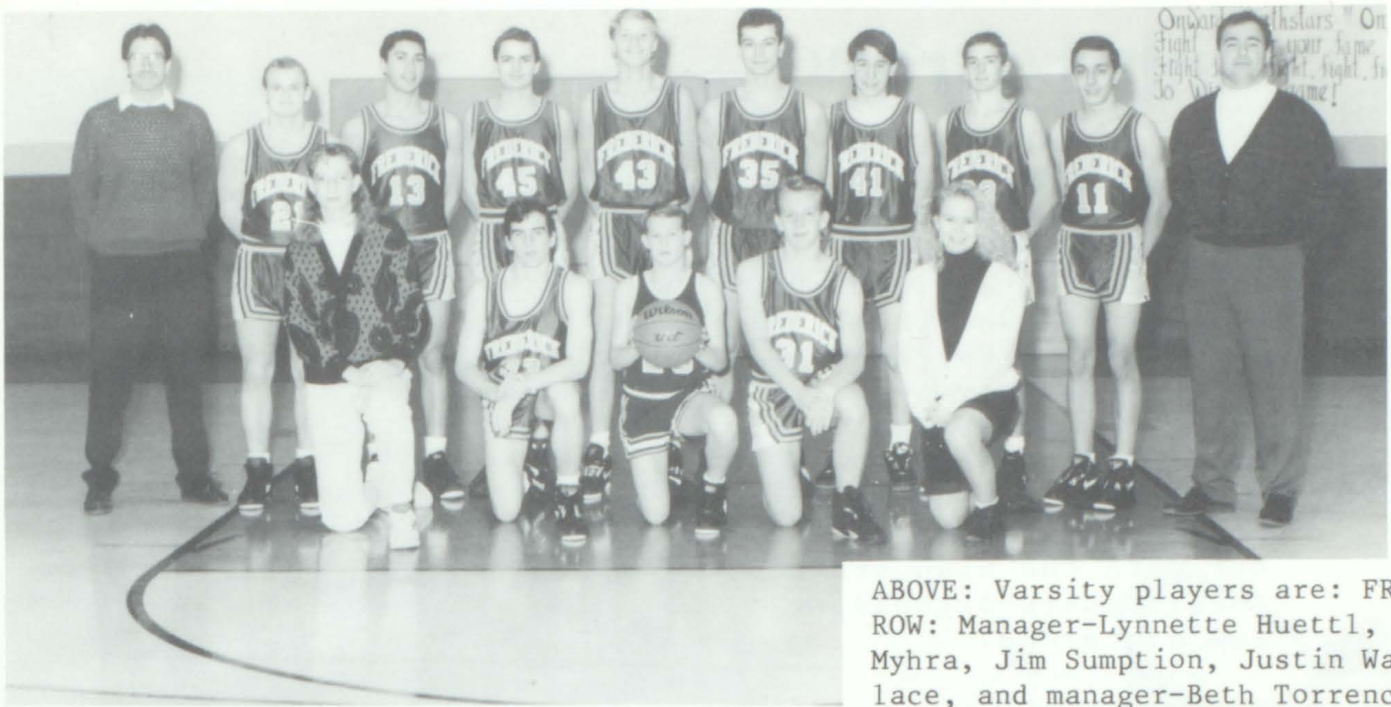

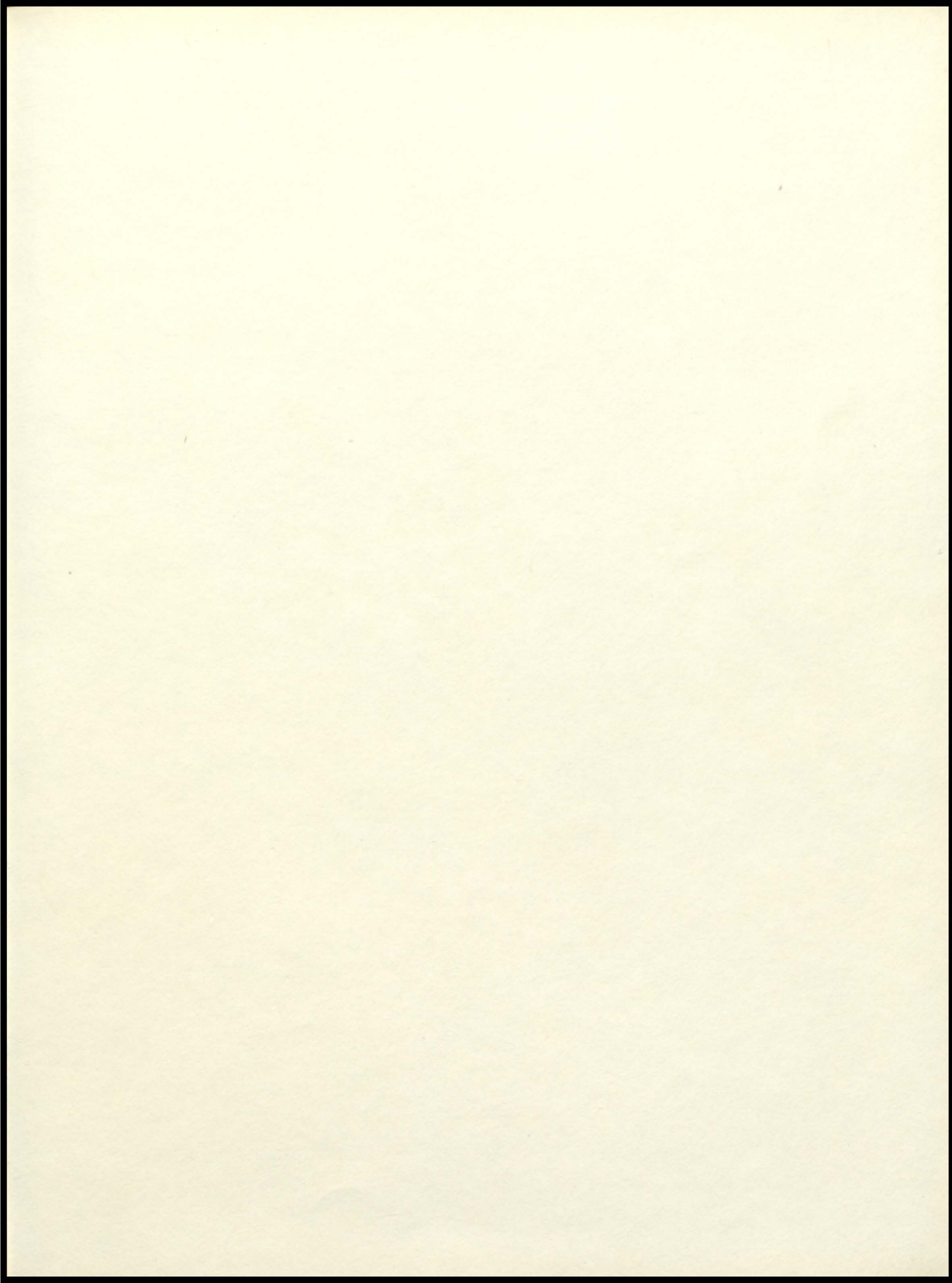
