
DEDICATION




The routine continues



Some participated in band, chorus, football, basketball, and track. Mark Sumption qualified for the State Citizen Bee held in Pierre.


























Activities increase

The first grade spelling bee winner was Jessica Winther. They went to Aberdeen for their field trip and toured the School for the Visually Handicapped.





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
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Hard work pays off

The Northstars ended their season with a 6-3 record and during that time they accomplished all those things.

The school spirit and pride grew with each win. The players worked hard on the field to 'rack up' their stats. Joel Campbell rushed for 1038 total yards. Mark Scepaniak had 60 total tackles. Eric Sumption attempted 72 passes and completed 31 for a total of 441 yards. Ralph Wallace caught 12 of those passes for 140 total yards.






Northstars head to Burke




The weight room was used quite regularly during the year. During the winter months, the weight program was done before school and at the end of the day.






Boy's basketball

Michele and Stephen both broke school records in the shot put this year.







Darlene Mikkonen, Bernice Rollo, Teresa Campbell, and Doreen Davis.





Jukebox Saturday night






Mr. Getty implemented an all-staff breakfast once a month the second semester to unite the two centers and create better communications.






