Next, the Vikings lost to Warner 42-24. Frederick was then shut out by the conference champion, Conde, by a score of 34-0 in the homecoming game. The Vikes came away from Roslyn with a 26-6 victory. After leading throughout the game, Frederick lost to Bristol due to a bad fourth quarter. The mighty Vikings then crushed their archrival, the Hecla Rockets, 36-8. In the last game of the season, the Vikes lost a tough battle to Langford 36-16. Frederick was outscored by their opponents 200 points to 162.
