



With only three seniors on the Viking squad, there will be some upcoming talent in the future from the underclassmen.







The 'B' squad cheered the boys' 'B' team to a 15-2 record by developing new actions and stunts. Members of the squad also led the cheering during girls' basketball games.




## 'A' Team Puts Forth Strong Effort



Frederick's girls' track team had a successful season. They finished 1st at the Lake Region Conference meet while setting seven records, 2nd at the Region 1B meet and qualified seven girls for the state meet in Sioux Falls.

At the conference meet the following people set new marks: Ann Marske-100 M dash, 200 M dash; Ronda Grieben-400 M dash; Denise Ellwein-800 M run; 2-mile, mile and 880 relay teams. The mile and 2-mile relay teams also set new records at the regional meet.

Seven girls qualified for the state meet by placing first, second, or by beating the qualifying time in their event. Those who qualified are: Ann Marske-100 M dash, 200 M dash; Ronda Grieben-400 M dash, 800 M run; Jennifer Wells-mile run; 880 relay (Jodi Lahr, Tina Mikkonen, Stacey Wilson, Denise E.), Mile relay (Stacey W., Denise E., Ann M., Ronda G.), and the 2-mile relay (Stacey W., Denise E., Jennifer W., Ronda G.).

At the state meet the girls received the runner-up trophy. Those placing at the meet were: Ann M-3rd in the 100 M dash; Ronda G.-3rd in the 400 M dash and 2nd in the 800 M run; 2-mile relay placed 2nd; mile relay placed 4th and the medley relay placed 5th.

Ronda Grieben was named most valuable female trackster for the second consecutive year.

The cross country teams finished the season by competing in the state meet in Brookings. Four girls and one boy qualified for the meet by placing in the top twenty at the Regional meet in Brookings. There were 81 runners in the girls' and also the boys' division. Overall, the girls' team took 9th in a field of 17 teams.

Frederick's 1980 boys' track team concluded a successful season by qualifying six boys for the state meet in Sioux Falls on May 23 and 24. Qualifiers and their events are as follows: Grant Bunke-Shot, David Hinz-Long jump, 880 relay (Rick Reisdorph, Todd Ellwein, Kermit Cantwell, David Hinz), Medley relay (Rick R., Kermit C., David H., Todd E.) and Mile relay (Kermit C., Shannon Ylitalo, Todd E., David H.). The boys were required to take first or second place or beat the standard at the Region 1B meet in Sisseton on May 16 to advance to state.

The team took fourth place at the Regional scoring 30 total points. They took third at the Lake Region Conference meet in Groton on April 29 scoring 57 points.

Kermit Cantwell was chosen most valuable track-

ster for the second consecutive year.

At the State Meet in Sioux Falls the boys showed well. The 800 M and medley relays and ninth best times, just missing the finals. The mile relay made the finals at the meet and came across the line with seventh best time.











### Academics Broaden Minds

The 1979-80 FHS curriculum proved very busy for many of the students. A majority of the students carried six or seven subjects while others had only a few and attended the vocational school in Aberdeen. No matter if the work load was heavy or light, the new lockers, purchased from the funds of the PTO Funfest, helped everyone to keep track of their assignments and books.

In all of the math classes, general math, algebra I, geometry, and algebra II, the language of science helped the students to organize their thoughts and plan how to solve the problems before they started. The LRC and NSC Math Contests were attended

by the chosen members of the classes.

To gain basic knowledge of the history of our nation and its people was the main goal of the American history students. Their study included

These students attend Vocational School every day for approximately the equivalent of two periods. The classes help to prepare high school students for their careers and future. Darnell Crawford was chosen as secretary to represent the Aberdeen branch of VICA.

The Driver Education course was divided into two phases; classroom study and "behind the wheel" instruction. Textbooks and films were the main sources of learning. Each student was required to have six hours of practice driving with the instructor.

The basic objective of this year's government class was to describe, analyze, and explain the American system of government. The students' course of study included Government Foundations, the Congress, the Presidency, and the Courts. The class was highlighted by trips to Pierre and Aberdeen.

Mechanical drawing class was designed to furnish the students with a study of the rules and principles that are fundamental to the making and reading of simple blueprints. Application into manufacturing and industry was also practiced.

The course of study in world history class followed the study of those who made history as well as ideas and happenings. The major purpose of the class was to survey world history in order to help the students understand their own times.

The biology students were involved with the basic biology principles—the study of the cell and its importance, a brief survey of a wide variety of plant and animal life, and an introduction to ecology. Various experiments were also included.


Physical education included learning and practicing the knowledge of rules and physical skills. Activities included various sports and a physical fitness tests at the beginning and end of the course. Teamwork and individuality in sports were applied.

-As their first high school English course, freshman English was planned to teach grammar skills, to develop basic writing techniques, and to encourage reading.

The emphasis in sophomore English was on the mastery of the basic grammar and spelling skills. A

second emphasis was placed on preparing and delivering speeches. Vocabulary enrichment was also incorporated into the English curriculum.

The junior English class studied American literature in correlation with their American history. The English shills were an in-depth study of punctuation and the complex sentence. Vocabulary and composition methods were also practiced.

The grammar skills needed only review in senior English with an accent on punctuation, vocabulary, and composition. During the second semester the main feature was a research paper on which each student chose his own topic of study.

The sociology-psychology class was divided into the study of the behavior of groups and individuals. Sociology class prepared a banquet of nationality foods as a special project. The psychology class took part in an observation of grade school students in Barnard.

The science students studied how the impact of science on their personal, social, and economical life makes a scientifically literate citizenry essential. The class learned of an appreciation and understanding of their lives' relationship with the environment.

Formulas, equations, and mathematical concepts were developed throughout the chemistry course. Chemistry was introduced in a manner that emphasized inductive reasoning as a characteristic of science. Experiments were performed to show the reality of the science methods.

The sole purpose of the general business course was to improve economic citizenship through the study of the business and economic environment in which we live. The four economic aspects of the course were personal management, consumer, social, and occupational or career.

Variety is the name of the game for the students in office practice. Each student was required to begin a set at the beginning of the year but moved on to calculators, stenocords, the ditto machine or the mimeograph machine. Throughout the entire school year the class was dedicated to working on the yearbook.

Shorthand proved to be a challenge for all as the students began by learning the basic strokes. They became more familiar with the technique as combined strokes and brief forms were introduced. The latter part of the year was spent trying to improve speed by means of dictation.

Bookkeeping provided students with the knowledge of basic business practices, beginning with assets, liabilities, and captial. Various business forms were presented and eventually, the students progressed to the more complex journals and 2 simulated business sets.

The study of nutrition, meal planning, meal preparation, consumer buying, crafts, clothing construction, family and child development, and housing were the fields studied by all three levels of the home economics course. Each unit was planned to interest the students now and to aid in similar facets of adult life.

Directing the social science and physical education classes was Mr. Darryl Walz. His subjects included World History, government, U.S. History, and freshman and sophomore physical education. Mr. Walz obtained his B.S. degree at NSC.

Heading the English department was Mrs. Bernice Rollo who taught the sophomore, junior, and senior English classes. She received her B.S. degree from UND Ellendale and her M.S. degree in English education from NSC.




