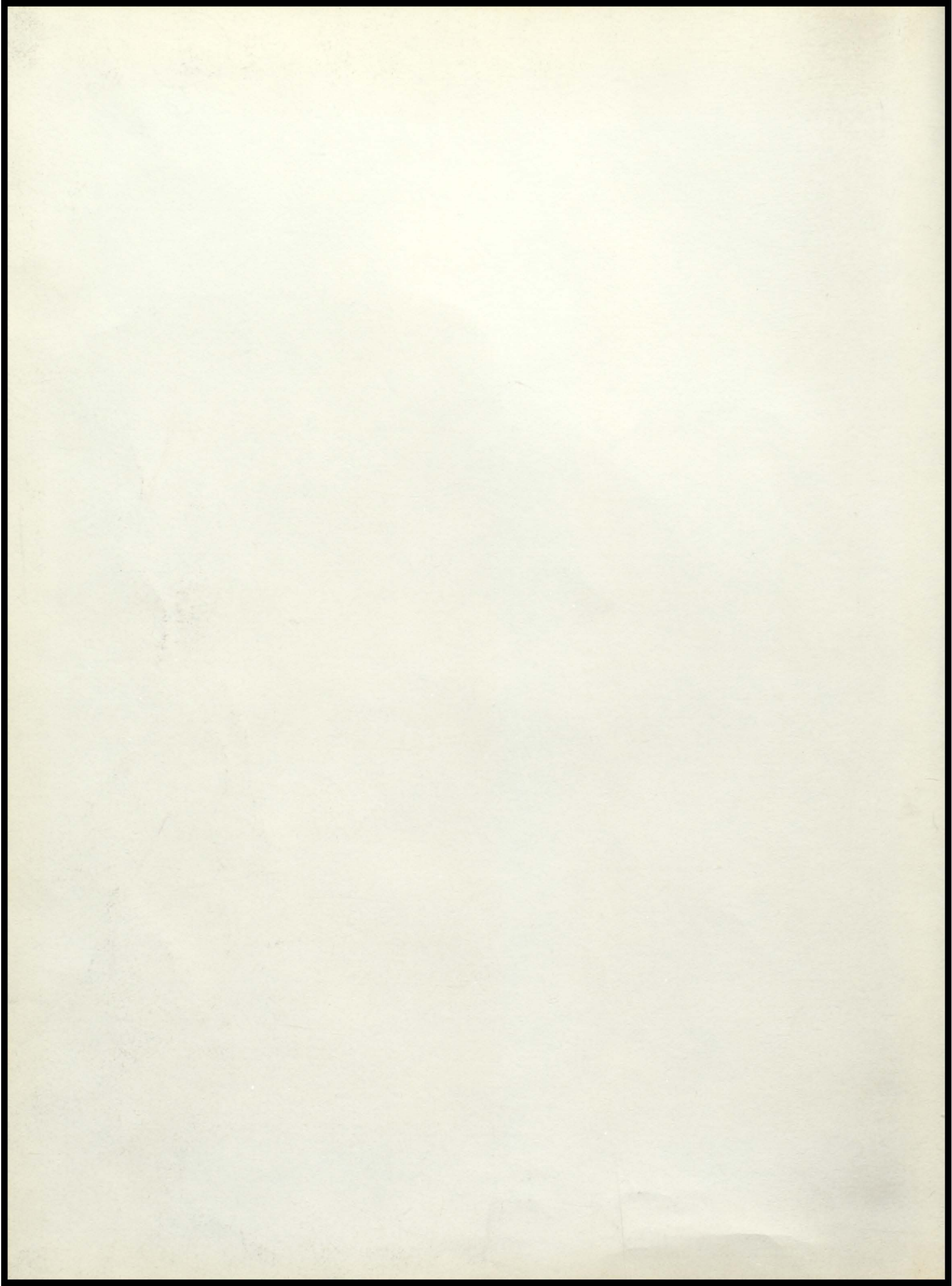

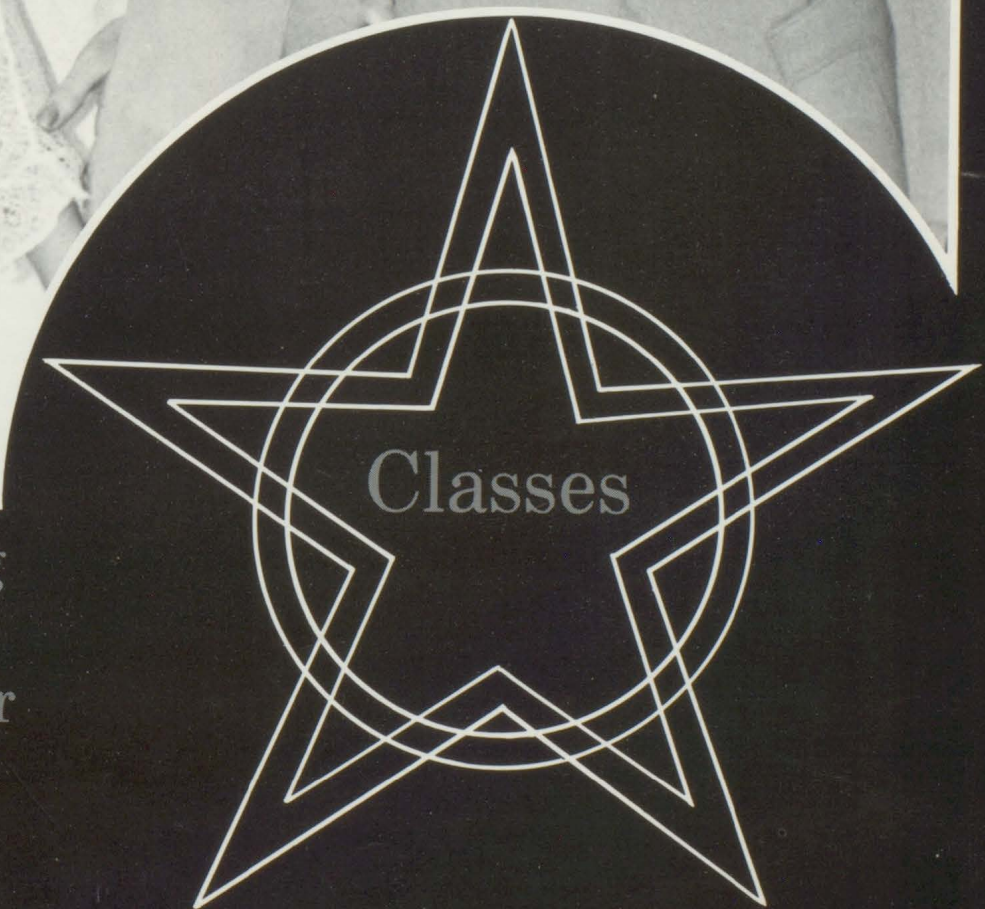

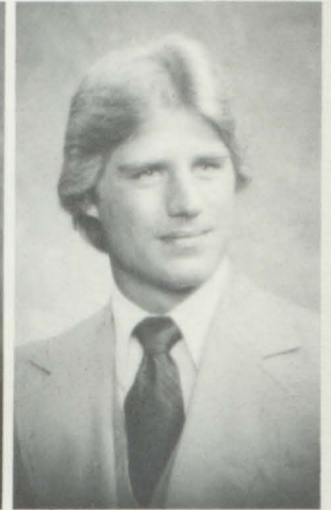
We Came In As Students . . .

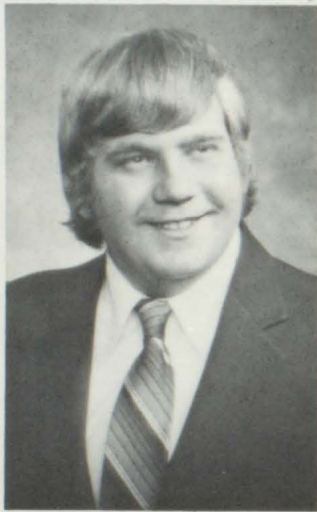
Two days of the senior class's year were devoted solely to government Day in Aberdeen sponsored by the American Legion. The second was the class's annual trip to the State Capitol.

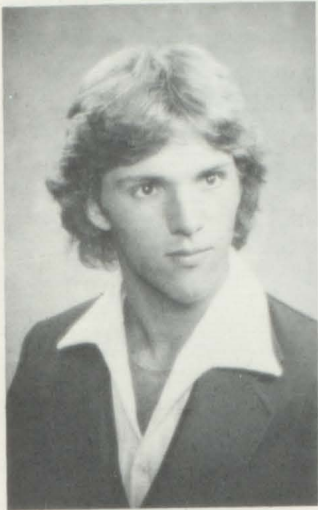

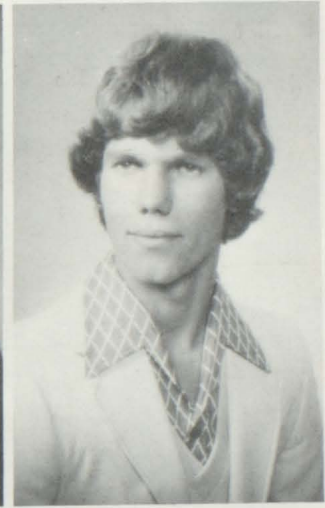

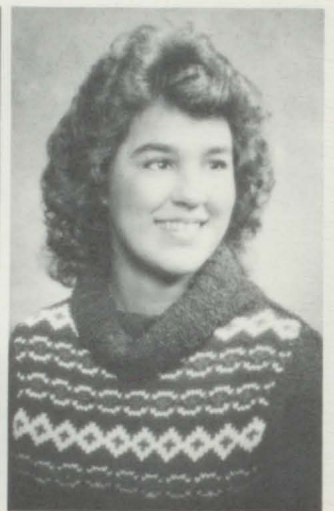

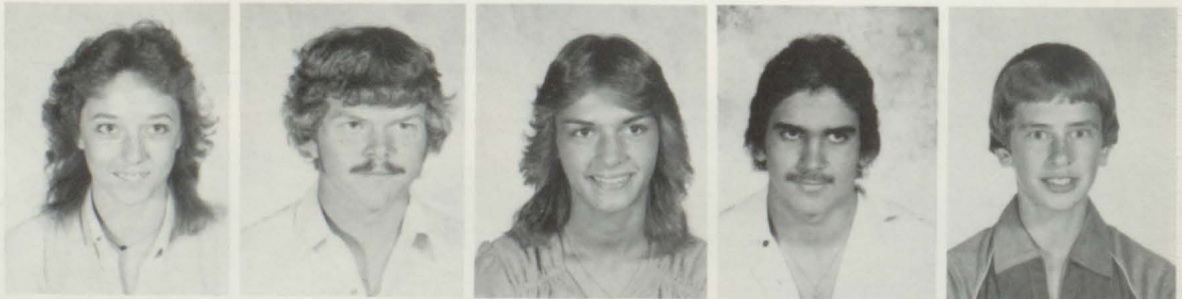
The concession stand was operated at all home games by the juniors to help their money-raising campaign. During the

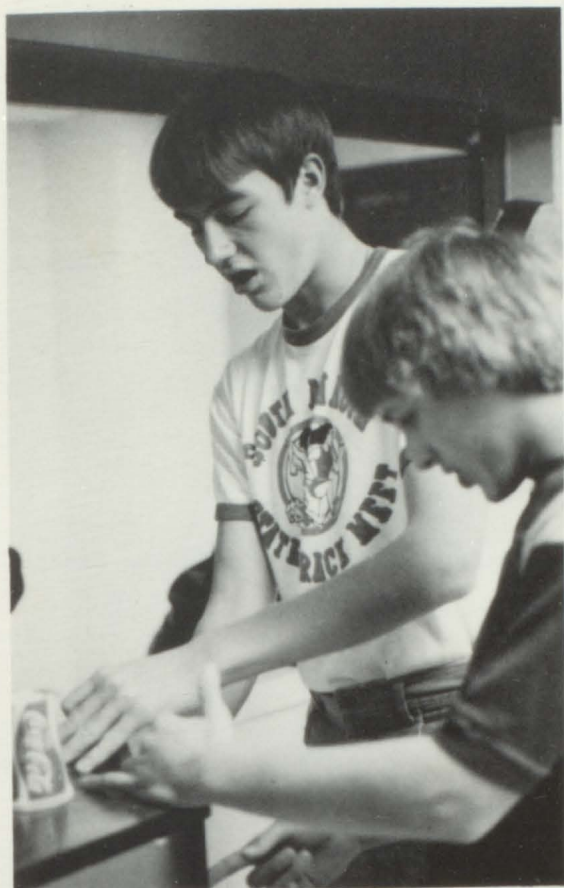

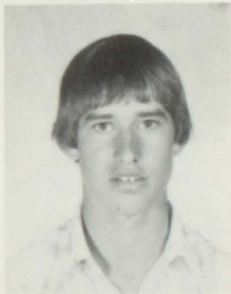

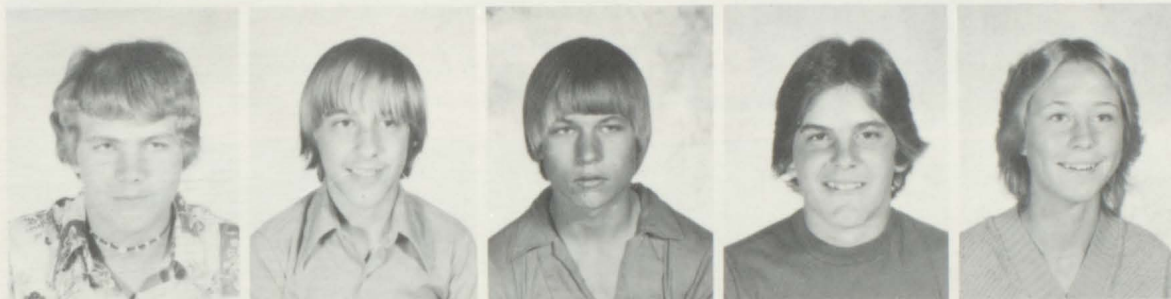

Trade School Enlightens Careers

The vocational school in Aberdeen caught the attention of many of the high school students. Of the numerous courses offered, FHS students were involved in seven of them.

In automotive class the boys were involved in all aspects of car repair from the basic tune-up to the complete overhaul. The year's study was divided into four sections—tune-up, engine service, electrical systems, and chasis.

Health care provided preparation for any type of medical career or vocation. The students were allowed four weeks of on-the-job training at any place in Aberdeen that involved the medical field. One week of CPR was also included in the study.

Carpentry, welding, and wiring occupied most of the classtime for the participants in building trades. Although there was some time spent in the classroom, the first year students were devoted to building a garage. The advanced students constructed a house.

The purpose of model store was for students to get occupational skills for entry level positions in retailing, merchandising, and store management. Pricing, advertising, display, controlling, financial records, discounts, commissions, and cash register operations were given extensive study.

The agri-business course included training in both agricultural production and agri-business, such as feed and seed dealers, farm implement dealers, farm machine adjustment operation and livestock feeds and feeding.



Catching a late lunch are the vocational students who don't return until about 1:00 p.m. each day. They leave FHS at 9:45, attending classes at the VICA center for close to two hours.

The students in television production were required to use their artistic abilities in their assignments of taking still pictures, developing, printing and splicing film, and writing, drawing, and producing their own moving pictures.

Training for dishwashing, waiter or waitress, cook, ordering supplies, and manager was given in the commerical food preparation course. Actual food preparation was also required.

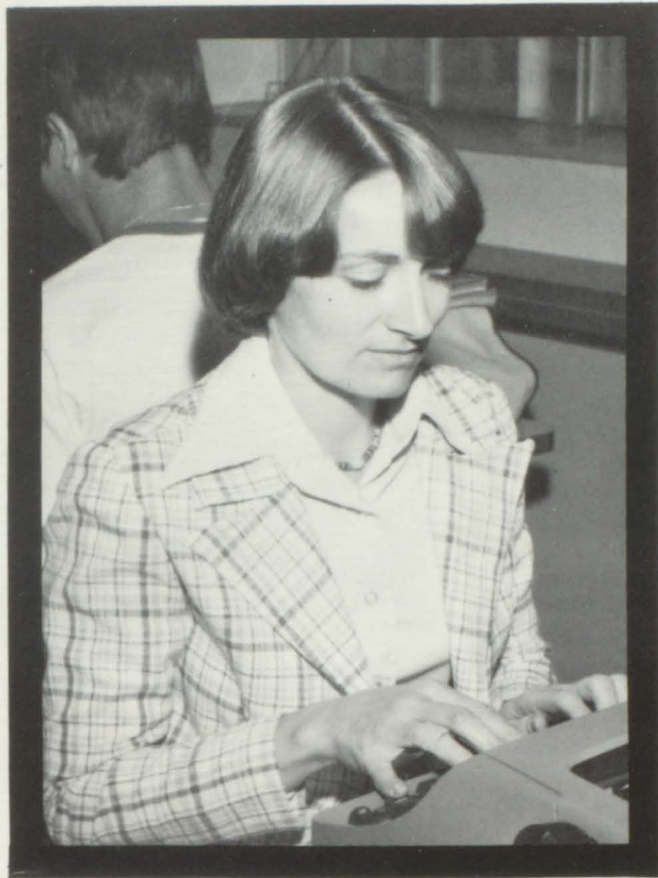
In his spare time Mr. Bensen likes to read, write, and practice amateur paleontology, the collecting of fossils.

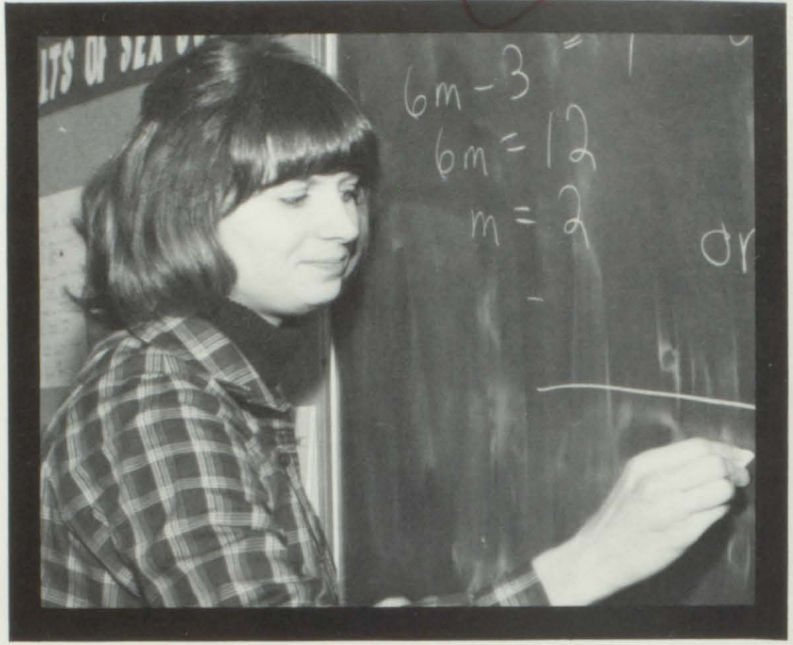

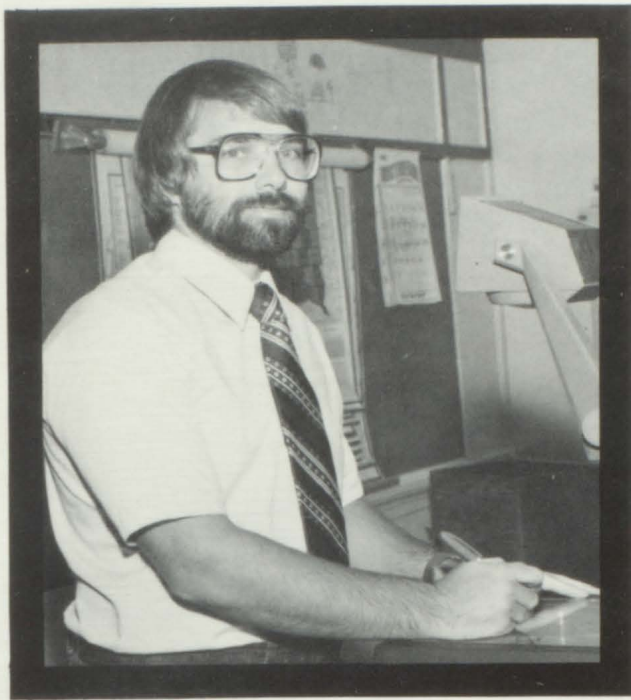

The business department hopes to expose its students to the relationship between data processing, keeping accounts, and problem mastery and the computer system.

Eventually, Apple II will be used to figure honor rolls and grade point averages, and will work in conjunction with the district office.

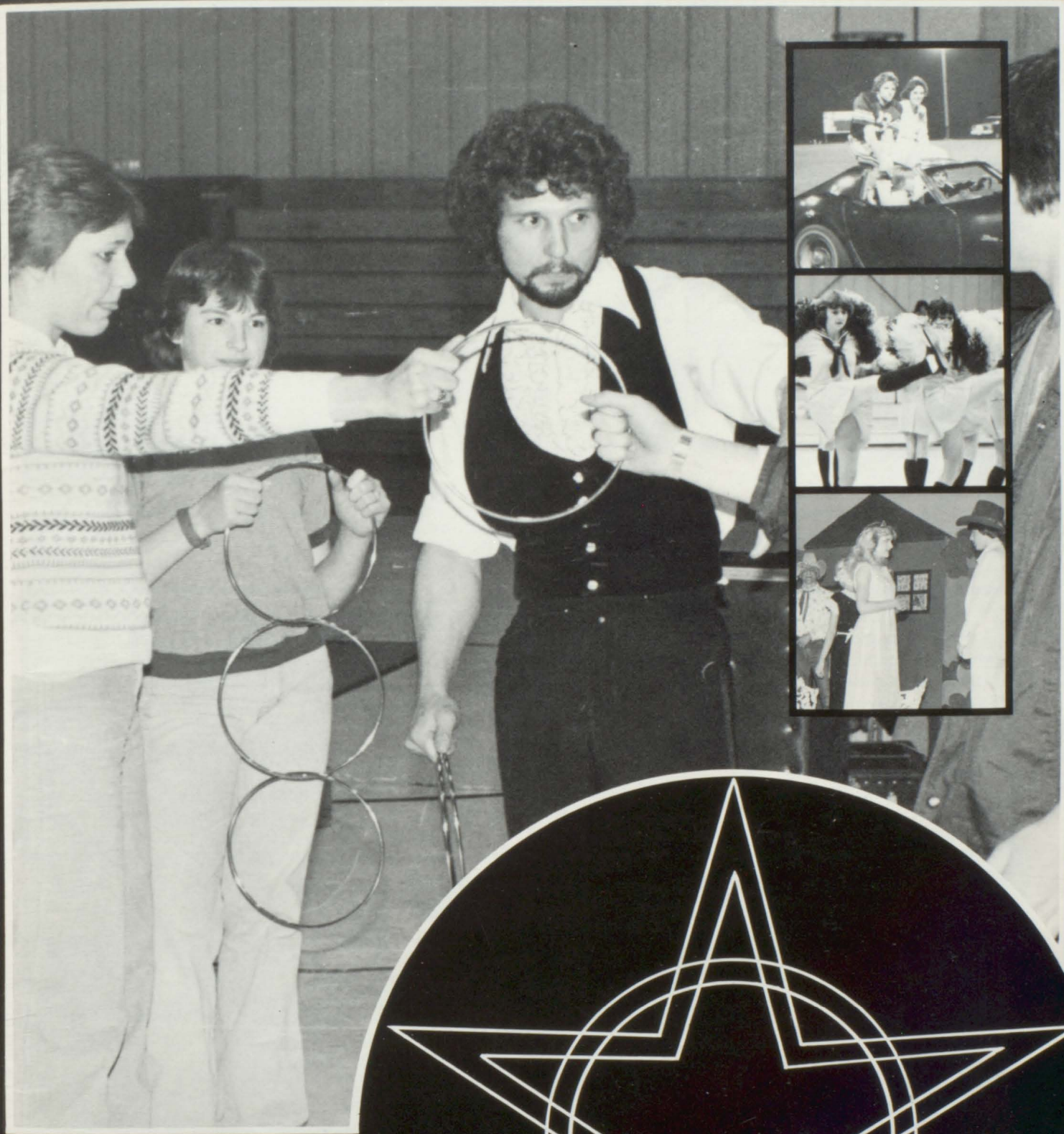

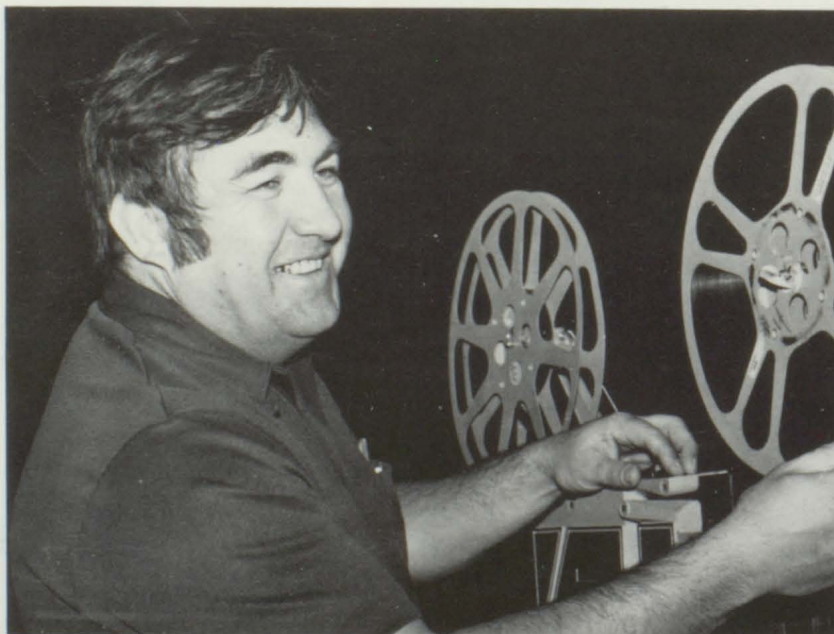

One original activity displayed that week was slave auction day. The freshman of the student body including the new faculty were

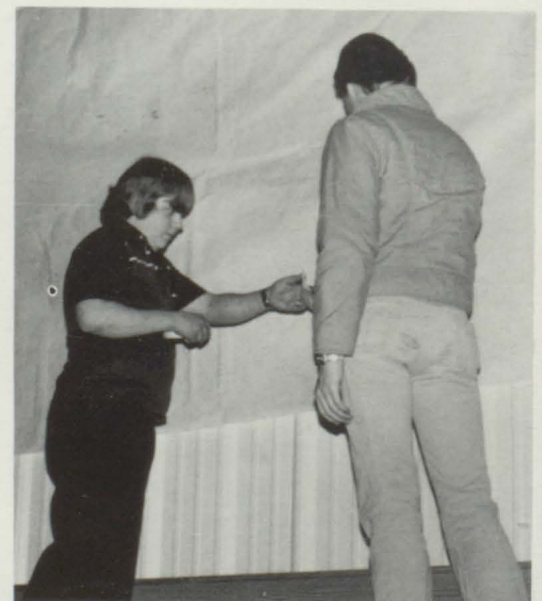

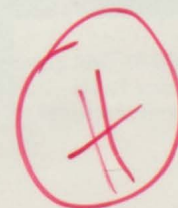

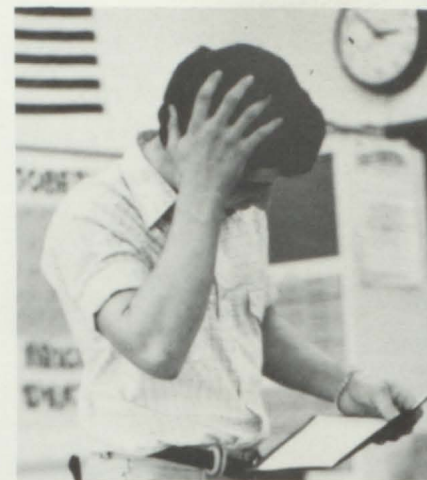

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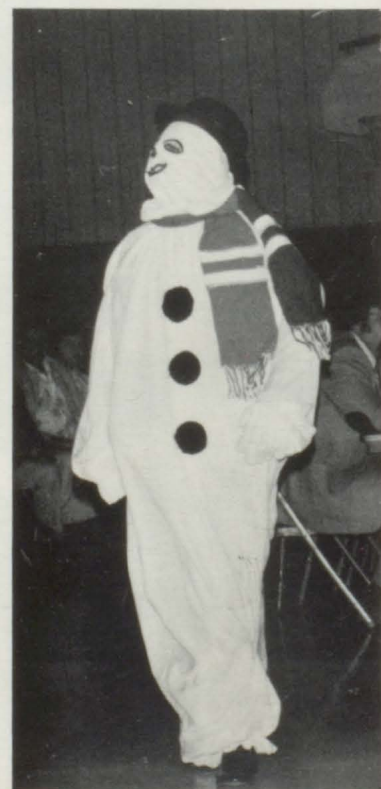
Senior Girls Contend For Title

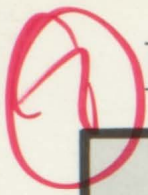

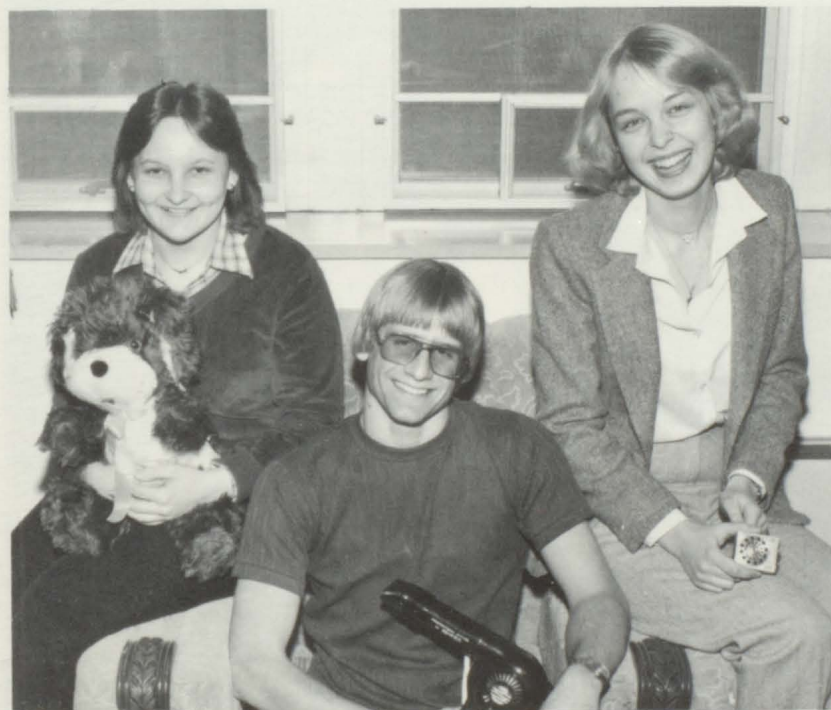

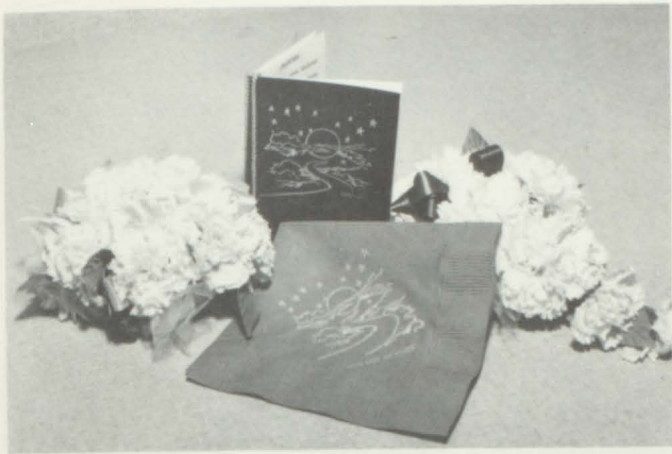

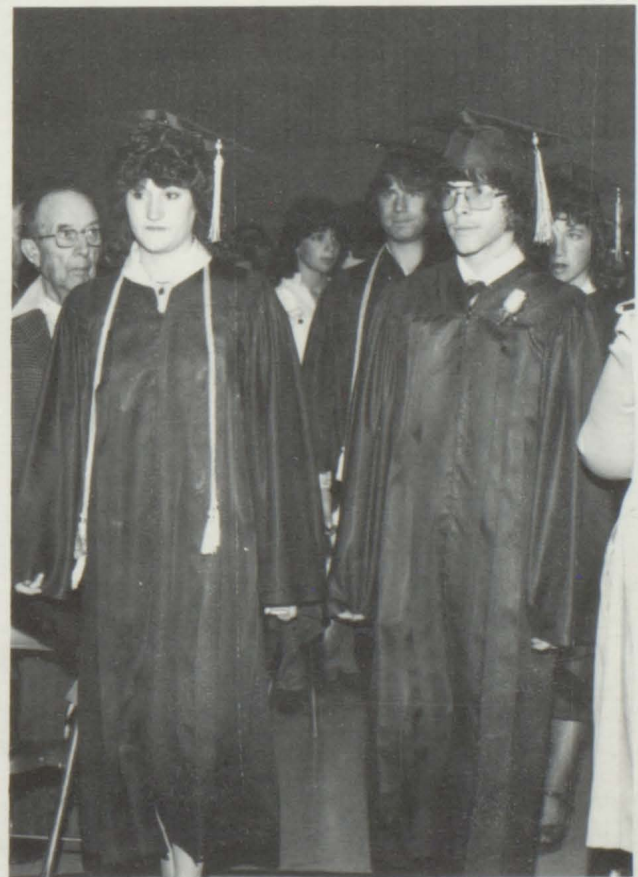

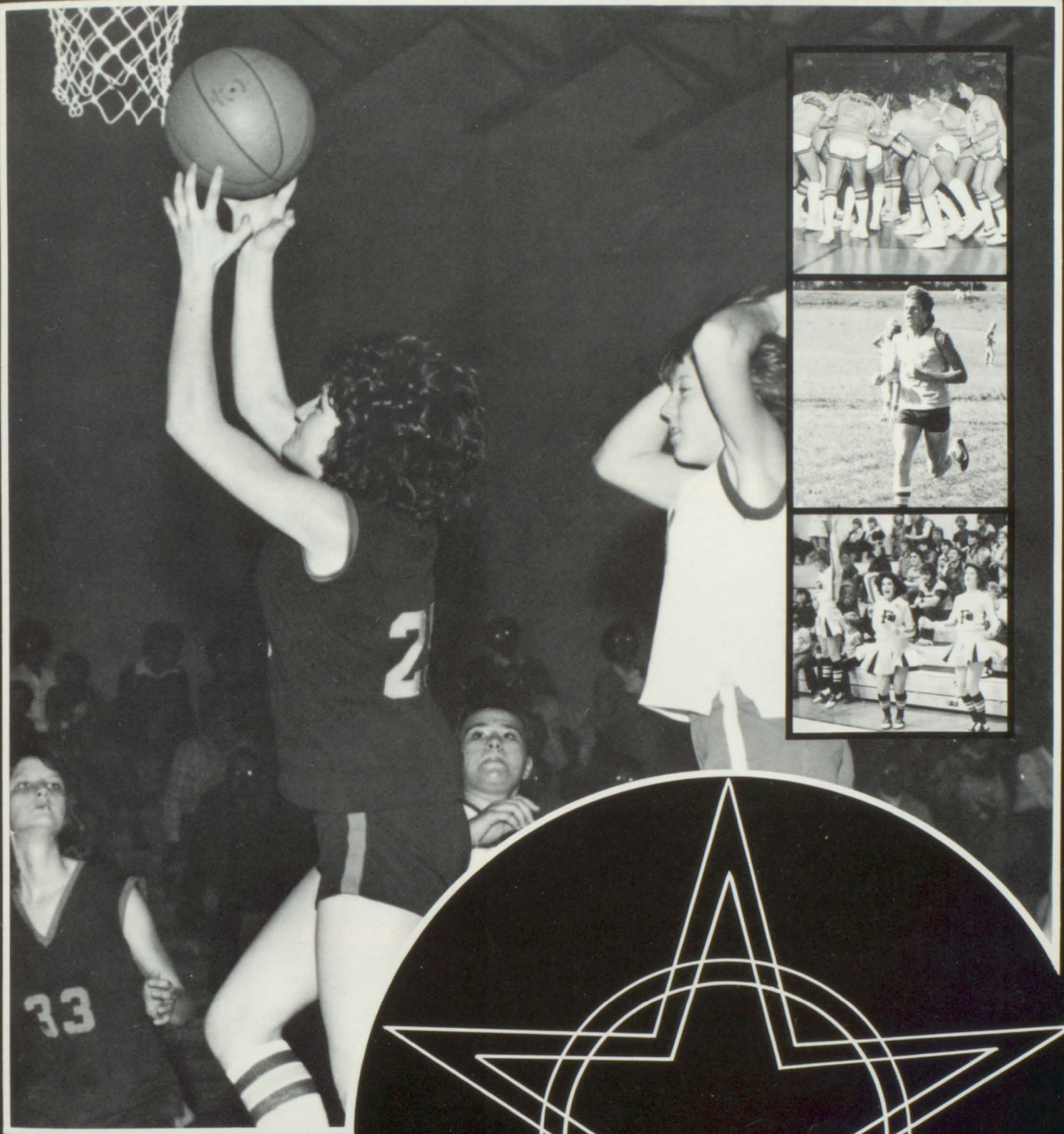

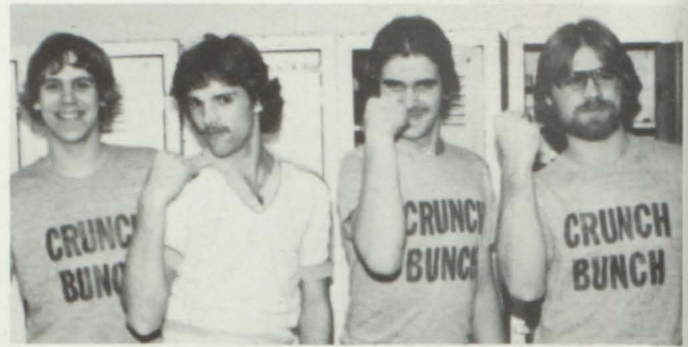
Crunch Bunch Unites For Successful Year

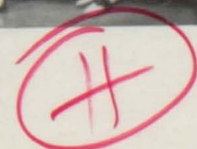

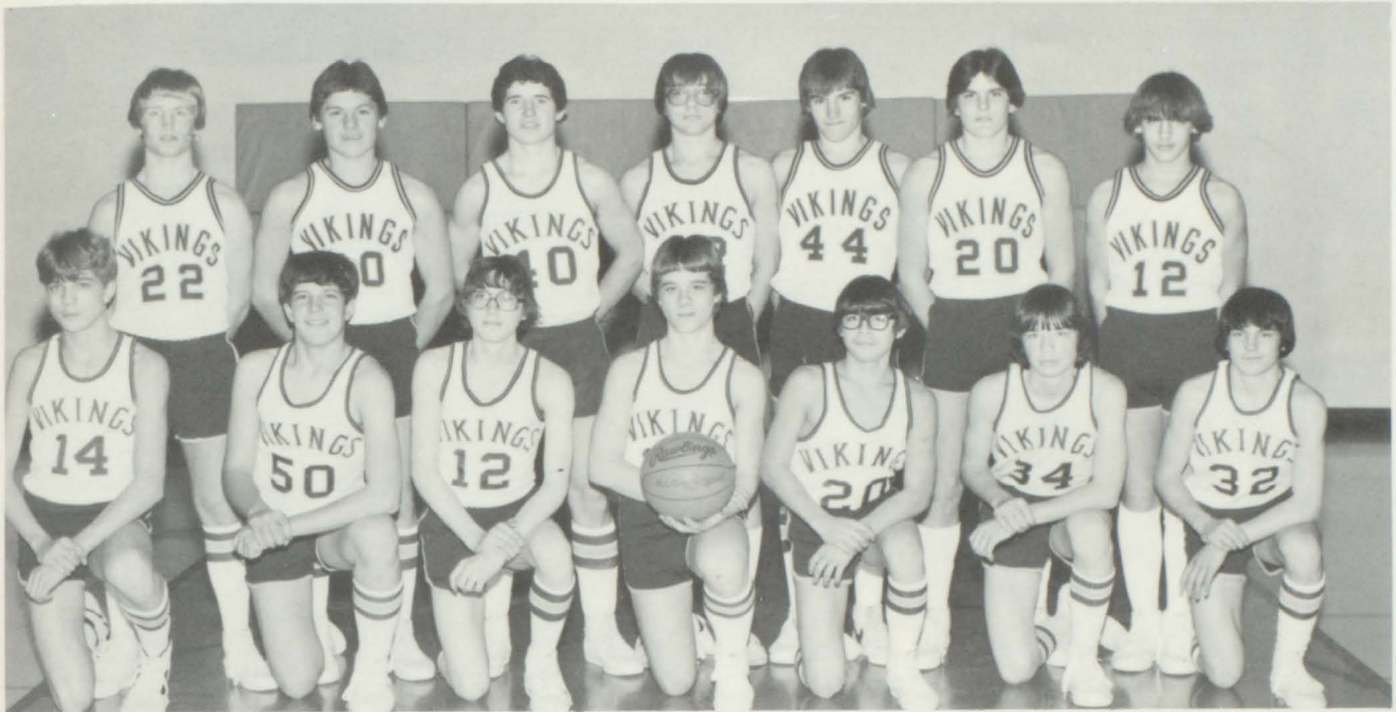

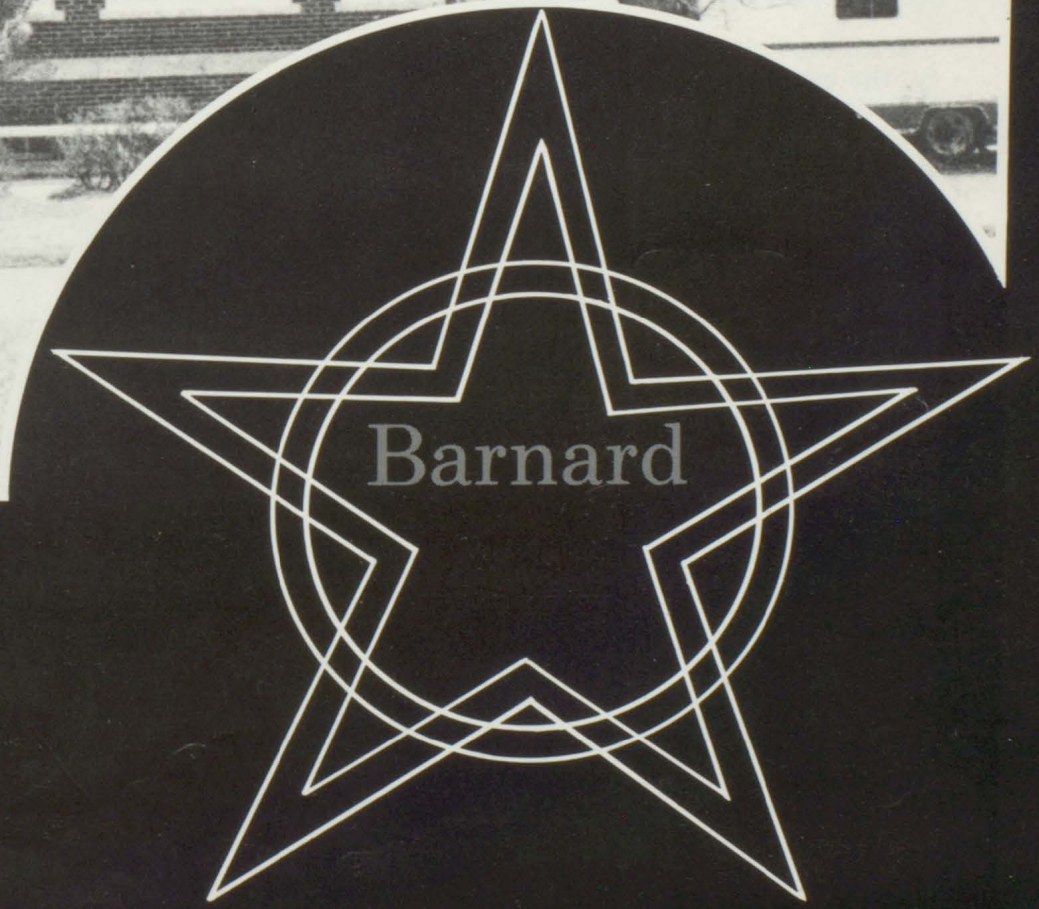
