In Frederick's younger days it was a bustling community serving the surrounding area. People came by the most popular means of transportation, horse and buggy, to trade and do business with the numerous shops.

Train service that ran through the town provided another means of transportation and communication with outlying areas. Telegraph service was also a form of communication located at the train depot.

A trip to the movie house, which had an admission price of 15¢, along with the occasional dance provided the town with entertainment.

Frederick provided educational opportunities in its local school along with worship services of three churches.

A hotel and rooming house accommodated travelers, while a livery stable took care of the needs of the horses and buggies.



So with deeply-felt gratitude, we salute you-Mrs. Rollo.





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
Juniors easily handle new responsibilities.

Proceeds from the concession stand and chili supper were used to provide decorations and a delicious supper for the Junior-Senior Prom.








Fourteen senior members participated in the State 'B' activities held in Sioux Falls on March 11-13.


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'RACE' - topic of commencement address



Vocational school adds industrial variety

The Hub Area Vocational school located in Aberdeen was the site for many new learning experiences for students of F.H.S. Frederick students were involved in seven of the many courses offered.

Students taking part in the agri-business course gained knowledge concerning the skills of agricultural production, business, and management. Throughout the year they tested crops and soil content, discovering proper planting methods.

Frederick students learned car repair skills in auto mechanics class. They learned how to repair cars and the many steps of automotive operation. The year was divided into four parts—tune-up, engine service, electrical systems, and chasis.

Building trade participants learned many carpentry skills during their classroom time only to distribute their skills by constructing a house. They also learned how to weld and wire.

Commercial foods class was the site for students who learned cooking skills, food budgeting, proper storage, proper temperatures, waiter or waitressing duties and dishwashing.

The basic electronics course proved to be very challenging to students as they discovered the basics of electricity. With their knowledge they repaired electrical equipment throughout the year.

Students learned health care techniques and studied medical occupations. They also learned CPR and other various medical treatments.

Students taking the radio and T.V. communications course learned the fundamentals of video taping and photography throughout the year.



She, her husband, and their six children live in Frederick. Mrs. Selchert devotes most of her spare time to caring for her family, sewing, and attending different sports activities.

She is assisted with duty by Mr. Terry Cormier, the school psychologist. The school board met the second Monday of every month. The meetings were held alternately at Frederick and Barnard. The business manager, Mrs. Sheryl Nixon, whose job included attending the meetings, kept records, and published the minutes in the Brown County News.

One of the big tasks for the school board was to help Mr. Quimby, the superintendent, plan the budget for each year. They authorized decisions for maintaining the school buildings, buses, and purchasing the necessary supplies and equipment used during the school year. Employing administration, teachers, and personnel, was a board decision. 

The school secretary is Mrs. Patricia Dennert. The variety of her work impresses Mrs. Dennert as the most interesting aspect of her job.











Vikings compete in playoffs









Junior High has winning season





Both varsity squads had winning seasons. The boys and girls teams won six out of nine meets; thus becoming conference and regional champs.






Workers do their jobs well
