



Freshmen experiment with new techniques






Mrs. Rollo and Mr. Walz were the sophomore class advisors.



The junior class was advised by Mrs. Marla Walz and Miss Roberta Biel.








Eleven senior members participated in the State 'B' activities held in Sioux Falls on March 10-12.

The busy year continued through May with final group and individual activities including the Junior-Senior Prom, awards night, senior night out at the Elks, senior tea, and graduation May 22nd.







Vocational adds choices to schedule

Twenty-seven students attended the Hub Area Vocational school. They were involved in six of the courses offered.

Participants in Building Trades learned a variety of skills. The first year students built a house, and the second year students constructed a solar house. Carpentry, welding, and wiring were some of the skills developed.

The first year students inlisted in Building Trades were: Kevin Richter, Todd Larson, Mark Jung, Richard Schlosser, Steve Huettl, Steve Dinger, Dwight Johnson, Lance Podoll, and Joel Bender. The advanced students participating in Building Trades were: Donna Schlosser, Becky Chapin, Dennis Hinz, Troy VanDover, and Scott Huettl.

Several took part in the auto mechanics class. They learned the many steps of automative operation. They studied all aspects of car repair from an easy tune-up, to the complete overhaul. The year's study also consisted of engine service, electrical systems, and chasis.

Those students enrolled in auto mechanics class were: Pat Ellwein, Welton Maunu, Lonny Mikkonen, Brent Durheim, Jeff Strand, Randy Bretsch, and Lance McDowell.

In addition to those activities, Brent Durheim, Pat Ellwein, Randy Bretsch, and Welton Maunu also participated in an area contest, where they took a skilled demonstration test in Aberdeen. Brent, Pat, Randy, and Welton placed first, second, third, and fourth, respectively. From there, they traveled to Springfield, South Dakota, for the Skill Olympics. Brent and Pat placed second and third, respectively. Brent was then eligible to go to Louisville, Kentucky, because the first place winner was unable to attend.

Medical Careers provided preparation for a job as a

nurse's aide. They learned many techniques for working as an assistant in a hospital or a nursing home.

Each student worked for three weeks in the Aberdeen Nursing Center. A two-week course on CPR was also studied

The class had guest speakers on related topics, and took various tours of the hospitals and funeral homes.

Students recorded in Medical Careers were: Rajean Anderson and Tina Mikkonen.

There were only two students in the agri-business class: Joey Livermont and Jeff Forsting. This course included training in agricultural production, business, and management. They tested crops and soil contents throughout the year, worked in their shop and learned welding techniques, how to repair farm equipment, and various other farm tasks, and took tours coinciding with their subject, also.

Tony Knox was the only participant from Frederick in Machine Shop. He worked with laythes, grinders, and various precision instruments. Many methods were learned on how to make several tools for numerous assigned jobs.

His class toured K.O. Lee, as well as other manufacturing companies.

The only student from Frederick involved in Radio and TV, was Joey Lahr. We learned the fundamentals of photography and development of his own pictures and slides. Also, video taping of the other vocational classes in session, was performed by the students with the learned proper use of lighting.

All of the students had the choice of whether, or not, to belong to VICA, FFA, or DECA.

Also, one student in each class was chosen as the student of the month. Rajean Anderson, Brent Durheim, Tony Knox, Joey Livermont, Welton Maunu, Tina Mikkonen, and Troy VanDover all held that honor in their class for one month.



During his spare time Mr. Walz enjoys various sports activities and he also umpires baseball and softball games. Mr. Walz and his family live in Frederick.



Mrs. Miller resides in Aberdeen with her husband and children.



Mrs. Nixon also learned more about the copy machine which was purchased last year for the district office and school.


The Nixons, Sheryl, her husband, and their two daughters, live in Frederick.









The Vikings basketball squad completed a year of rebuilding after four of last years starters were lost to graduation. The team did play farily well, but had some struggling periods.







New programs and experiences help prepare students

Students received individual and small group instructions in the special education classes, which are taught by Mrs. Portia Johnson, in Barnard.

The Chapter I program, under the direction of Mrs. Waldstein, provides remedial reading for students in grades one through eight. These students receive approximately two hours of instruction per week. She is also in charge of the new Challenge Program for intellectually gifted students, who attend one hour of class per week, in grades three through eight. Also, the Talent Pool meets approximately once a month for a special activity, such as a field trip or a guest speaker. Mrs. Diane Miller, Mrs. Waldstein's assistant, runs the library and resource center on Fridays. She also teaches some reading to students and has classes in library science. In addition, she answers the phone whenever necessary.

Mrs. Melanie Holsten is the speech therapist for Barnard. She also conducts speech and hearing tests in both Frederick and Barnard for those students who need to be tested. In addition, she tests pre-school children and serves several schools in the surrounding area.

New and exciting experiences for the kindergartners were meeting new friends, riding the school bus, and learning the



routine for school. The kindergartners took part in the school Christmas program and entertained their parents again with a special spring program. Activities for the year included making Christmas cookies, bread, butter, and ice cream. In addition, the students spent many hours practicing the alphabet, numbers, and completing exercises to help them develop the left-to-right method of reading and writing.



The English teacher, Mrs. Kelly Hinds, taught the principles of correct English, sentence punctuation, and other English criteria.




