This Viking is our small way of saying "thanks" for all that you have done for us. You taught us about life and



The seniors traveled to Pierre to observe legislative sessions. Dana and Susan served as pages in the House and Senate respectively.


These events left the seniors looking forward to their final months of school.



New requirements for sophomores











9-0 and couldn't go

The Frederick Vikings had a very successful season. The Vikings rolled up a 9-0 record, won the Lake Region Conference Championship, but missed the playoffs because opponents on their schedule didn't come through with enough victories to boost Frederick into postseason play. The team had help in their perfect season from a new coach, Tom Oster, who was assisted by John Rasmussen.

Dave Campbell, Lee Marske, Ken Dinger, Mark Hoerner, and Pat Mikkonen made the LRC Team. Chosen for special honors were Dave Campbell by the Argus Leader and Lee Marske by the Aberdeen sportscasters for being all-state football players.

The Viking team finished the season with 2,452 rushing yards. Leading the team was Mark Hoerner with 1,076 yds. on 131 carries, an average of 8.2 yds. a carry. Following was Ken Dinger with 766 yds. on 97 carries, an average of 7.9 yds. a carry. Lee Marske led in passing with 56 completions out of 132 attempts for 853 yds.

Leading the defense in tackles was Pat Mikkonen with 92 tackles at an average of 9.2 tackles a game, followed by Jason Heis with 79 tackles at an average of 8.7 tackles a game.

Statisticians for the season were DeeAnn Hinz and Renee Kolb. Student managers were Mike Bender and Pat Kinslow.

The small, inexperienced junior high team played three games and their record for the year was 0-3. The new junior high football coach, John Rasmussen feels they will show much improvement in upcoming years.






Homecoming activities attract attention



novels in English class.


In math: geometry, formulas, and the use of variables, mathematical equations, and inequalities were studied. They were introduced to checking and savings accounts.

Seventh grade offered productive knowledge

The Seventh grade class, under the guidance of Kelly Hinds, had a busy but productive year as they became involved in junior high class rotation and activities.

In geography, the seventh grade students studied climate, the rotation and revolution of the earth, weather, and the hydrologic cycle, as well as learning about the earth's different regions.

In science, the class learned how to classify plants and animals. They studied the different life forms of the protozoa, plant, and animal kingdoms, which built up to a more detailed study of the human body systems.

Student teacher with artist highlight year



Extra help is offered

Barnard's special education department was used not only to meet the needs of individual students but entire classes. Individual work gave children a chance to correct educational weaknesses. It also provided more time for the teachers to devote to the regular class. The Brigance inventory test was given to gauge the basic skill level of some of the students. Portia Johnson, one of the special ed. teachers, helped children with learning difficulties overcome or lower the intensity of their problem. She also worked with them to polish up math skills. The other special education teacher was Mrs. Monica Dix, who worked with all students, kindergarten through eighth grade, to improve their reading comprehension in all subjects. Joyce Durick, the Chapter I Math instructor, helped students use the correct problem solving techniques. She met with students several times a week.

Beginner's are small energetic group

Starting school brought some new experiences for the kindergarten class of Barnard. Eating together in the cafeteria and playing with each other in the school yard helped them get to know each other. The children used traditional music, art, stories, and food to help them understand the holidays better. They were also part of the grade school's Christmas program. Cara Dennert, their student teacher until after December, helped to introduce them to the basic colors, numbers, and the alphabet. With the D'Nealian handwriting method they learned to print which prepares them for cursive writing in future grades. A few weeks before Easter, the Home Ec. II and III classes visited them. They taught them some new songs and told them a story in honor of the spring season. The children planted seeds in easter eggs. They were given an opportunity to learn cooperation, respect for their peers and their teachers, and responsibility (from duties performed).






