
We, the Senior class of 1986, dedicate our Viking to you who have understood us, cared for us, and lived with us. Our thanks to you, Senior Parents.

There are millions of things we appreciate, but we never really have gotten the chance to express our feelings. So right now we would like to say thanks parents for everything-We Love You Mom and Dad!






Responsibility is our job

Mrs. Charlotte Helgeson, the new English teacher, taught English I, II, III, and IV. The freshmen have been reading novels and studying grammar usage. They read the play Julius Caesar and watched the film on TV with a VCR. They read A Night To Remember, a novel about the sinking of the Titanic, and Animal Farm, by George Orwell. They made posters illustrating their opinion on two novels, A Day No Pigs Would Die and The Outsiders.

Preparing and giving speeches was the first semester project for the sophomores. They read The Outsiders, by S. E. Hinton. They worked on their grammar skills the last por-

tion of the year.

The juniors had a semester of creative writing and poetry and created some of their own to put in a poetry packet. For a change of pace, they read some American fiction, and continued on to American novels for the rest of the year.

One of their favorites was Huckleberry Finn.

After a brief review of grammar skills the seniors worked on a contract grade in English Literature. The periods studied included the Middle Ages, the Renaissance, the Restoration - Eighteenth Century, the Romantic Age, and the Victorian Age. The seniors viewed MacBeth and Peter the Great as part of their studies. To conclude their fourth year of English, the seniors wrote a term paper using a topic of their choice.



Home Economics offers a variety of subjects

Miss Carmen Warkenthien served as the instructor of the home economics and the art classes this year. Miss Warkenthien, one of the three advisors, aided in advising the junior class in all of its fund-raising and prom activities.

The first-year home ec. class was taught the values found in the four basic food groups. They served meals for a few chosen guests. As an introductory to sewing, all of the students in this class were to prepare either a "big foot" stuffed pillow or stuffed alphabetical letters. After this basic sewing project, they each chose a pattern and sewed some type of clothing.

The Home Ec. II and III classes joined to form a single group this year. The students enrolled in this class began the year by a sewing project of their choice. Miss Warkenthien taught them some pointers on job interviews and preparing a resume in addition to the sewing project. During the second semester the students prepared meals, some of which were from other countries.

On January 2nd, 1986, eight Frederick alumnists visited with the juniors and seniors, telling of college life. For this occasion, the three home ec. classes prepared a small brunch.

As tradition has led us previously, the home ec. students modeled their finished sewing projects at the annual style show held in early May.

Artistic ability was shown in the art classes of 1986. An example of this is the "We are the World" mural used as the background at the Snow Queen Contest. Also, the art classes were taught some basic skills on calligraphy, still life drawings, creative drawings, string art, cross stitchery, and abstract art.

Because this was Miss Warkenthien's first year of teaching in Frederick, some changes were made, such as the presewing project. Miss Warkenthien is formerly from Clark, South Dakota, and is presently residing in Frederick, South Dakota.



Computer for Mr. Kjellson

Greg Kjellson was head of computing this year by teaching the math and computer classes. Classes that were taught by him included Algebra I, two geometry classes, senior math, and four semester-long computer I classes.

Algebra I was taken by freshmen, geometry by sophomores, juniors, and seniors, senior math was solely by a senior, and computer I by sophomores and seniors.

Representatives from the Algebra I class for the Lake Region Math Contest, held on April 16, 1986, were Jo Lynn Rohwedder and Robin Smith. Chris Catlette and Troy Podoll represented the geometry class at the contest. Troy Podoll tied with another student for first place.




Hands on experience brings knowledge

Mr. Oster also taught the P.E. and weight classes.















Ann Luoma, Amy Gerlach, and Heather Mikkonen compiled the stats after every game.






















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Jr. high girls gain valuable experience




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Declam—not only girls

There were only ten Vikettes this year, but that didn't stop them from showing off a bit. The girls performed at districts during the Frederick basketball


game and also at State B's in Huron.

Gymnastic team reaches for the stars






On the local level, there was a change from Sanderson's Store to the Community Store, many people donated to help.
