



Mike Bender was a member of our class for many years, until joining the Adjustment Training Center in Aberdeen. They are both very special to us and we wish them the best of luck in the future.




























"Juniors, your pop order is due today."





Teaching reading and gifted deserves awards

Elm Valley School was lucky enough to have one of four state finalists in the U.S. West Outstanding Teacher Program from our school. Rose DesCamps was that finalist. She heads the chapter reading program, the gifted program, the talent pool, and the future problem solving team.

In her chapter reading program she used the basic idea that good comprehension is the key to good reading. She shared those ideas with parents in a news article she wrote for the Brown County News.

The talent pool group, consisting of grades four through six, could participate in the activities of South Dakota Centennial or aeronatics. Many of the students also participated in the mini-unit on archeology.

"The Future Problem Solving Team at the junior high level scored well on a problem related to Youth and Nutrition, but not well enough to go to the State Bowl", stated Mrs. DesCamps.

Her special programs help to enrich the curriculum with improving thinking skills, decision making, communication, and for some leadership and extended research.

After working with Mrs. DesCamps programs, some students have been given the opportunity to apply to go to the South Dakota Governor's camp held in Vermillion in August. Last summer two students attended the camp, Reed Mahlke and Corey Maunu. This summer Sara Sheldon will be attending. The camp allows the students to use leadership along with their creative abilities to complete projects or solve problems in a short amount of time. At the end of the camp, awards are presented for their accomplishments.

First year for all school music

New music instructor, Ms.
Liz Labesky, gave some interesting responses when asked about teaching the elementary music classes this year. "I love working with younger kids, even though the transition is a challenge when coming from the high school to the lower grades." Ms.
Labesky adds that entertaining the kids and keeping her patience for a whole hour are two very important factors of her daily routine.

At the beginning of the year Ms. Labesky said she hadn't set any goals until she analyzed what she was working with. Now she has three very important ones. One is to enjoy music. The second is to appreciate all kinds of music. The last is to be able to perform the music. Those three goals help her guide the students toward the concerts. Ms. Labesky remarked that the concerts are very important for the students, mainly because it gives the kids a positive reward from their parents and helps build up pride and confidence in themselves. To Ms. Labesky that is a good enough reward for herself to keep working toward the next day and the next performance.



The middle of the year he and his family moved from the farm site by Barnard back to Aberdeen. They purchased a home there.






Three season coach


The seventh and eighth graders joined forces to sell taffy as a fund raiser for each class. The taffy was made in South Dakota. The students shared the profits at the end of the sale.

The visiting poet had the junior high English classes write poetry.








Despite the long ride with seven people in the school car, the day was a learning experience. This public speaking may prove to be beneficial to students in future careers.

Roberta Eisenbeisz, coach for the Vikettes, is always on hand to keep the girls in proper form and the smiles from leaving their faces.



this side of the border.



The library club was still active in keeping the library well-arranged, attractive, and offered assistance to any student in need.






Overall the juniors may have changed a few traditions, but the evening was undoubtedly a success.

Milissa Paul remembers the last game at Districts. Milissa felt that she got her chance to prove to everyone that she really is a basketball player.


Geraldine Klipfel said, "It seemed that if Ann Rohwedder fouled out of the game, it took no more than three minutes before I was sitting beside her."

Season's "Up-downs"




On defense the Northstars leading tacklers were Mark and Justin Scepaniak. Mark led the team with 72 and Justin had 53.

"I couldn't believe it, I was so shocked", were the words of Darin Podoll, who along with Mark Scepaniak, were selected as All-Conference team players.


With the Northstars losing only five seniors they hope to do even better next year.








The Vikings played eight home games, eight games away and one district game. In each case the team mates tried to create a solid positive attitude to go along with their physical readiness.






Relay teams excel




Mean while other members of the track team were participating in such events as: high jump, long jump, triple jump, shot put, and discus.


Track may not be the most popular sport, but the athletes find it both challenging and rewarding.


The girls recieved a "pep paddle" while at camp. This was given to the team who showed the most spirit. They were judged by their fellow cheerleaders.


