





They became familiar with the niceties of high school, namely more sports opportunities and especially going downtown during lunch hour.


Sebastian Hammel said, "Going downtown to get pop and potato chips is awesome!"

Elementary students continued to add to their education base, as they progressed through the grades. Teachers and staff who have scheduled their entire lives around a five-day school week quickly adapted to a four-day week. The day began a little earlier and ended a little later, with every other Friday as an open day. Two Fridays each month teachers were in school, attending meetings, offering enhancement and tutoring and learning through professional development sessions. During November, school was in session every Friday (except Thanksgiving weekend), so the required number of days could be scheduled. Also, Fridays were used to makeup snow days, which landed students and staff in school a couple of Fridays during the winter months. School continued until the end of May, with students leaving on Thursday, May 27, and teachers putting in their final work day on Friday, May 28.

Teachers depended on workshops and organizations such as the Northeast Area Reading Council to keep them aware of current educational trends and materials. A majority of the elementary staff joined the reading council, as did a couple of junior/senior high teachers. Nearly every staff member was involved in these workshops and educational organizations in addition to the rigors of keeping up with students, plans, grades and extra-curricular activities.








There was a change this year as to the time of the day that the first hour classes started. Instead of the regular 8:25 a.m. start, this year's Frederick Area students began their day at 8:15 a.m. Since there was only one study hall this first hour of the day, not many students got the chance to slack.

A large group of juniors and seniors was missing during the mornings because of the vo-tec changes made from. Instead of following tradition and having vocational classes in the afternoon, the students traveled to Aberdeen everyday at 7:10 a.m. and returned to school at about 10:10 a.m. This was a result of the new four-day week that was implemented.

In the downstairs classrooms, Mrs. Sumption started everyday teaching physical science to the freshmen.

The other downstairs classroom belonged to Mr. Morlock, who taught junior high health first hour.

Spanish I, mentored by Mrs. Hertel and Mr. Eisenbeisz was another transformation made this year by the sophomores. There were so many students in this class that they had to be split into two rooms known to the teacher as "Frederick Elementary" (in the library) and "Frederick High School" (in Mrs. Hertel's room). Getting Spanish I class done right away in the morning was a relief to them, but also meant that they had to have their homework done first thing.

For the upstairs classes, Mrs. Barondeau taught Accounting I for half of the week and had a study hall for the other half. Also, Mrs. Ruenz flip-flopped between Publications and Journalism II throughout the year, while Mrs. Wampler taught the junior high students different aspects of art.











At Frederick Area, there has traditionally been an hour dedicated to band and chorus. Third hour also included business math and chemistry to accomodate the non-music students.

Students played "The Angels Mix", "Bobsled Run" and "Holiday Snippets" at the Christmas Concert and "Best of Kiss", "Best of Journey" and "Stairway to Heaven" at the Spring Concert. The chorus sang "Jazz Kyrie" and "Deck the Hall" at the Christmas Concert and "Orinoco Flow", "Open Arms" and "Til' the Walls Come Down" at the Spring Concert. This year, the band consisted of 65 students and the chorus included 41 students in grades 7 through 12.


Senior Jamie Parsons commented, "This is math that I will take with me after school and use in real life experiences."



The last class held sixth hour was 11th grade English taught by Mrs. Brokaw. Throughout the year, the students worked on various types of reading including short stories, novels and poems.



This class was taught by Mrs. Ruenz, who commented, "The mystery unit was the best part of the year because students were able to read short stories online, and they also made a group presentation."





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From early-season qualifiers to stunning performances at Howard Wood to a state title, this year's track season proved successful for the Frederick Titans. A total of 11 people made it to state, nine boys and two girls. Four of those boys, Derek Barondeau, Tyler Sumption, Brandon Haas and Cole Truebenbach capped their season by winning the 1600-meter relay at state with a time of 3:31.05. They held off Philip, who finished with a 3:31.34. The same four also placed third in the 3200-meter relay with a time of 8:21.16. Brandon finished fourth in the 300-meter hurdles with a :42.16 and Adam Duterhoffer was third in the state as he threw the shot 50-4. Brian Sumption tied for sixth in the high jump with a jump of 5'11". The state track meet was held in Sioux Falls on Friday and Saturday, May 28 and 29.

A handful of records were also broken throughout the season.

At only the second meet of the year, Brian jumped 5'11" to state-qualify and set a Titan record. Injuries kept him sidelined during much of the season, but he was back for the state meet.

One relay that qualified at the Howard Wood Relays was the boys' 1600 meter relay with a memorable performance. Although they had to compete in the slow heat, the boys nabbed second place overall.

Adam shattered the school record in shot put several times, despite not beginning to throw until late in the season due to previous injuries. He managed to dominate in shot put at the region meet, launching an impressive 48'10", which annihilated the Titan record he had just set a week before.




