There was a change this year as to the time of the day that the first hour classes started. At Frederick Area, there has traditionally been an hour dedicated to band and chorus. Third hour also included business math and chemistry to accomodate the non-music students.
Students played "The Angels Mix", "Bobsled Run" and "Holiday Snippets" at the Christmas Concert and "Best of. Kiss", "Best of Journey" and "Stairway to Heaven" at the Spring Concert. The chorus sang "Jazz Kyrie" and "Deck the Hall" at the Christmas Concert and "Orinoco Flow", "Open Arms" and "Til" the Walls Come Down" at the Spring Concert. This year, the band consisted of 65 students and the chorus included 41 students in grades 7 through 12.
In addition to concerts, music students also participated in all-state band and chorus and the spring contest.
Mr. Downes, a first year teacher at Frederick, taught business math to the students that weren't involved in band or chorus. In this class, they learned about everyday math skills that could be used in the future.
Senior Jamie Parsons commented, "This is math that I will take with me after school and use in real life experiences."
Chemistry was a small class of three this hour compared to the seventh hour class. They learned about atoms, molecules and how elements react. Taking chemistry third hour allowed the senior boys to leave school earlier in the afternoon, since they arrived early for vocational classes.

By the time fourth hour rolled around, everyone was getting anxious for lunch. The cooks had the food ready and while elementary classes had begun eating, everyone in the building could smell the day's menu...especially if it included garlic toast or cinnamon rolls. Despite the aromas, students knew they needed to stay focused on their classes, which included seventhth grade math with Mr. Downes and eighth grade math with Mrs. Hertel.
Eighth grader Cole Hinz commented, "Math right now is fairly simple because we are reviewing for the Dakota Step Test, but we have learned a lot about equations, volume and surface area this year." He added, "Math is a little bit harder this year than it was last year."
Fourth seemed to be the hour for math classes, as the freshmen tackled Algebral with Mrs. Barondeau. The general consensus seemed to be that learning Algebra I was a lot different and harder than their junior high math classes had been. Study halls were often dedicated to getting Algebra I assignments completed or seeking extra help from the teacher.
Sophomores took on the challenge of biology before lunch, while the juniors had physical education for the first semester and government during the second semester. Over the duration of the first semester, the students took part in various activities including yoga, pilates, kickboxing, self-defense and archery.
During their last year of high school, the senior class took English fourth hour, the only time the group was together in class. Freshman learned about foreign affairs in world history during the first. semester and geography during the second semester, both classes taught by Mr. Morlock.
Taryn Flinn commented, "Right now we are learning the countries of Asia. It's actually kind of fun because we each get to do a power point over a few of the countries.?
Sophomores were introduced to Accounting I over the first semester this hour, taught by Mrs. Barondeau. Mrs. Barondeau also taught personal finance this hour to a small group of upper classmen. This class taught them about financial concepts that they will use in the near future with college just around the corner.

Juniors took part in Algebra Il this hour taught by Mr. Downes. Learning the equations proved to be somewhat difficult for some students, while others passed the class effortlessly.

As they headed towards the end of the day, students did not have as many classes during sixth hour. The seniors that remained at the school had a study hall and some of the teachers had elementary classes. Mr. Morlock taught elementary physical education, Mrs. Wampler taught elementary art and Mr. Eisenbiesz taught elementary music.

From early-season qualifiers to stunning performances at Howard Wood to a state title, this year's track season proved successful for the Frederick Titans. A total of 11 people made it to state, nine boys and two girls. Four of those boys, Derek Barondeau, Tyler Sumption, Brandon Haas and Cole Truebenbach capped their season by winning the 1600 -meter relay at state with a time of $3: 31.05$. They held off Philip, who finished with a $3: 31.34$. The same four also placed third in the 3200-meter relay with a time of 8:21.16. Brandon finished fourth in the 300-meter hurdles with $\mathrm{a}: 42.16$ and Adam Duterhoffer was third in the state as he threw the shot 50-4.
